Saturday, June 8, 2013 MINUTES

The day began with Morning Prayer, led by Convention hosts, the Lancaster Convocation, with reflections provided by Convention Chaplain, The Right Rev. Sean Rowe, Bishop of Northwestern Pennsylvania. The service ended with the symbolic return of the crozier, diocesan seal and Constitution and Canons to Bishop Baxter, signaling the end of his sabbatical.

Bishop Baxter thanked Bishop Rowe for his reflections challenging the Convention. Bishop Baxter announced that Bishop Rowe had declined his Chaplain honorarium and asked that it be given to The Rev. Leslie Doyle scholarship fund for Episcopal campers at Camp Mount Luther. Bishop Baxter will make a matching gift to the fund in honor of the legacy of Mother Leslie in the diocese.

The meeting was called to order.

Rev. Looker thanked Vice Chancellor Chuck Banks, The Rev. Canon Stephen Casey and Canon Linda Arugedas for their assistance in the work of the committee. She also thanked those in who responded to the call to serve.

Appointment of Tellers and Voting Instructions: Secretary Powell announced that Polls will open at noon and the results will be shared at 2:30pm. He reminded delegates that Ballots are in their packets. He asked that they use only the white ballot. In event of tie the yellow ballot will be used for a second count. He asked that ballots only be marked for the vote as any extra markings would be considered a disqualified ballot. He asked that delegates only vote for the number indicated for each order as overvotes will also be deemed disqualified. He confirmed that under-voting (i.e. voting only for one person where two are eligible) will be accepted.

He explained that the Tellers were nominated and chosen prior to convention. He asked the Tellers to report to room 114 at noon to begin counting.

Mary Kisner (Christ Church, Berwick) and Ms. Sue Ellen Spotts (St. Andrew's, Lewisburg). They have each been appointed to serve a full six year term.

A motion was made and seconded for the concurrence of Convention to the appointments.

Rev. Kisner was asked to stand. Ms. Spotts was not in attendance at convention. There being no further questions, the motion passed unanimously.

Annual Reports of Ministries: Secretary Powell made a motion to receive the Annual Reports of the ministries and institutions of the Dioceses, which have been published on the diocesan website and will be published in the Journal of Convention. The motion was seconded and passed unanimously.

Finance Committee Report: Finance Committee Chair, Mr. John Small, presented the Finance Committee report to Convention.

He noted that a presentation regarding the budget highlights had been made at the previous evening's preview meeting. Mr. Small would present other issues before the Finance Committee.

The investment trust has had a good year. The Finance Committee sets the overall investment and asset allocation policy in conjunction with advisors and the Bank of New York Mellon (BNY Mellon). The policy seeks to minimize swings in the market. The investments are currently held in eight asset classes (mainly fixed income and large gap asset accounts, with trace amount in six others). There are 125 separate accounts in the investment trust. For the year 2012 the overall return for trust was 9.5%, with a 3 year return of 6.48%. Mr. Small encouraged parishes that, if they are not using the trust currently, to consider those returns.

Mr. Small noted that the 2014 budget gives an increase in the operation grants to parishes. Bishop Darlington grants will continue to be available. These grants were used well in 2012. Heistand loans also continue to be available to parishes for upgrading projects.

Property and casualty insurance claims were minimal in 2012. There were a couple of instances where parishes had to be assisted in difficult claims, but they have been resolved.

The Diocesan House at 101 Pine Street has been listed for sale. Although the commercial property market is depressed, the building continues to be actively marketed while staff and committee members explore options to re-locate.

Mr. Small called for questions from the floor.

Mrs. Dorothy Kapnic, St. Andrew's, Harrisburg, referred to p. 29 of the budget, asking what funds are being used to fund the mission enterprise zones and the new transitional deacons. Mr. Small explained that these are coming from the general operating funds, which can be found on balance sheet. Mrs. Kapnic asked the percentage of the fund being used for these purposes. Bishop Baxter explained that the Finance Committee would need to research to provide her with a specific answer, but he directed her to review the operating fund in the balance sheet.

Bishop Baxter called for a motion to adopt the budget as presented. The motion was made and seconded and passed by a majority vote, with abstention.

The Rev. Bill Alford, St. Andrew's, Harrisburg made an objection, stating that convention was not given adequate opportunity to discuss the budget. Bishop Baxter explained that opportunity was given for questions. There was also opportunity to discuss at convocation meetings and Friday evening, and so ruled that the vote to accept stands.

Noon Day Prayers Noon day prayers were led by the clergy of the Lancaster Convocation.

Following prayers, Secretary Powell announced that voting was open and indicated the location of the ballot boxes at the main doors of the room.

Lunch Break Bishop Baxter declared the Convention to be in recess for lunch. He asked that delegates return to re-start the business session at 1:15 pm.

Reconsideration of Budget: Following the report on the voting results, Ms. Tracy Novinger, St. Andrew's, Harrisburg made a motion for reconsideration of the 2014 Diocesan Budget. The motion was seconded and passed with a majority vote.

Ms. Novinger opened the discussion by making a statement from St. Andrew's, Harrisburg about the concerns they have regarding the move to make St. Andrew's congregation in the City of Harrisburg into a mission church and the concern that this move is being rushed. Bishop Baxter intervened in her statement to say that this is not a budget issue and asked if there is a specific question about the budget itself. He asked that she and her delegation consider and then can return with any specific budget questions, in order that those who wish to discuss the budget itself could do so.

Ms. Stephanie Francis, St. Paul's Wellsboro asked about the decision regarding the decrease in funding for the Episcopal Home. She noted from the budget that it appeared to have lost 50% of its diocesan funding and asked how that decision was made.

Bishop Baxter asked Canon Zwifka to speak to the matter. Canon Zwifka noted that the Finance Committee and Council of Trustees have a responsibility to balance all the priorities of the diocese in order to make a working budget. Sometimes the decisions are hard, such as when support to one area must be decreased in order to continue support of other priority areas. This is not a judgment of the worthiness of the ministry. In this case, both the Finance Committee and Council of Trustees agreed that this was an appropriate move. The number in budget for this year was a cut from the previous year, but that was with the understanding that the Home was developing a strategic plan for fundraising. That plan is going forward and they are now engaging in fundraising. Because of concerns expressed at the Council of Trustees regarding support of the Home, a taskforce has been appointed to look at the concerns and needs of the Home. Mr. Tom Gemmill, of St. James, Lancaster, and The Rev. Janis Yskamp, of the Potter County Churches, are co-chairing. A report will be made to the Council of Trustees at their Fall meeting.

Bishop Baxter reiterated that the Home has a strategic plan for the coming five years that they are working on. They are seeking pledges of \$1,000 per year for five years. Bishop Baxter has committed to that and encourages others to also consider supporting this effort. He indicated that people who wish to support the Home should be in touch with Canon Mary Grace Shearer, Executive Director or Deacon Patrick Strohl, Board Treasurer.

Mr. Nick Marouf, St. Andrews Harrisburg, asked where in the budget did the \$25,000 come from for the St. Andrew's Harrisburg mission church effort, St. Benedict's mission church and the mission enterprise zones.

Canon Zwifka noted that in the budget publication provided in packets the mission zones have a note, "pending continuing funding". Each of the funding streams for the mission zones must be approved by the Council of Trustees and Finance Committee. They will each be an ongoing program where benchmarks are set and must be met to obtain further funding. It is a time certain program with 3 years of graduated decline of subsidy available. It is not a permanent budget item.

Mr. Marouf asked for an explanation of the source of the subsidy funds. Canon Zwifka explained the Council of Trustees approved the use of a portion of diocesan investment funds, as per the allowable

guidelines of the funds, which are available to the diocese for operations funds for just such a purpose. There are also funds available in the diocesan investment portfolio that are specified for mission and ministry. The specifics of the funding of the subsidy are complex but have remained faithful to the restrictions on the investment funds and make only minimal use of any unrestricted funds. The money will only be used for the designated line items, i.e. the Transitional Deacons/Curates and the Enterprise Mission Zones. Only the specific expenses will be drawn down and if there is money left over after those expenses, it will not be spent on anything else. Reviews of these projects and the use of the funds will be made during the year to both Finance Committee and the Council of Trustees.

Referring to line items 17200 and 17250, Mrs. Kapnic asked for confirmation if this meant that the project grants are being rolled into the operating grants. Canon Zwifka confirmed that this is the case. Mrs. Kapnic asked for a list of who received grant money this year. Canon Zwifka said that information is on the website, but he can also send it to her. Canon Stephen Casey, who serves on the grants committee, explained the process of the grants. The budget made available \$135,000 for grants, but the committee received requests for \$190,000 in grants. They then sent the applications back with the invitation to reduce their asking. If the amounts then fall within the budgeted amount, the committee honors the full request. If it is higher than what is available, then a sub group reviews the applications and allocates the funding that is available. In the current budget process the original amount was for \$200,000, of which they knew \$20,0000 was allocated to project grants. When budget was originally showing a deficit it was evident that it would be necessary to cut the amount available for grants. The grant application procedure will begin again in a few weeks.

A request was made to call for the vote on the motion to accept the budget as presented. The vote passed unanimously.

Reminder of the Rules of OrderCanon Dan Selvage reminded delegates of the rules of order for debate on the resolutions, specifically the time limit for each comment, the use of the red and green cards to indicate whether the comments were for or against the resolution, and the 20 minutes total time allowed for debate on each resolution.

Appointment of Chancellor to be Temporary Chair of Convention Bishop Baxter appointed Chancellor Barbara McLemore to be temporary Chair of Convention, relinquishing the gavel to her for the duration of resolution committee report only.

Chancellor McLemore called for the report of the Resolutions Committee.

Resolution Committee Report Committee Chair, Rev. Chappell, read each resolution and the Resolutions Committee moved acceptance of all the resolutions, with the request that the proposer of each resolution speak to that resolution.

The motion was seconded.

Resolution 2013-001 Clergy Association Membership on Clergy Compensation Subcommittee (the full resolution can be found at Appendix IV)

RESOLVED: That the Episcopal Clergy Association respectfully recommends that the Bishop consider appointing a member of the Clergy Association, selected by that Association, to the Diocesan Subcommittee on Clergy Compensation.

Clergy compensation subcommittee Chair, The Rev. Canon Ken Wagner-Pizza, noted that this motion was submitted on behalf of the clergy association, which is a group of all the clergy in diocese. He read the full resolution to convention for their consideration.

The Rev. Stephen Harris stood to say he affirms the resolution, but moved that an amendment be made as follows:

"and be it further resolved that this convention affirms that recommendation."

The motion for amendment was seconded and passed by majority vote.

A motion was made and seconded on the resolution as amended and passed with a majority vote.

Resolution 2013-002 Church Employee Compensation (the full resolution can be found in Appendix IV)

RESOLVED: That the following clergy and lay employee compensation policy be adopted by the Diocese, and that the diocesan convention review this policy in 2015, having been advised by the Standing Committee and the Finance Committee Joint Subcommittee on Clergy and Lay Employee Compensation and Benefits.

Rev. Chappell asked the presenting party to speak on behalf of the resolution. The resolution is presented by the Congregational Development Commission who indicated that no instruction is required. Rev. Chappell read the resolution aloud.

The motion was seconded and discussion invited.

Tony Nicholson, St. Marks Lewistown inquired if clergy will vote on the resolution, stating that if they would, he would like to speak against them doing that, since it will involve their salaries. He indicated strong reservations regarding clergy and those being paid by diocese voting for their salary.

The Rev. Chris Pyles, St. Johns Bellefonte, a member of the Congregational Development Commission, explained that they were tasked with reviewing clergy compensation, which was last reviewed in 2011. The procedure they followed was to survey nearby dioceses in an effort to make compensation packages that are in keeping and competitive with other dioceses so we would be in a position to attract clergy to Central Pennsylvania. He asked that it be kept in mind that those parishes most affected are those least likely able to support fulltime priest.

Mr. Tyrone Powell, Convention Secretary, explained that there is already a compensation schedule that has been approved by Convention for years, which indicates the terms of minimum clergy compensation. This resolution is to simply require that parishes default to at least the minimum wage. This resolution is not to vote on clergy salary, but simply puts in place a minimum wage structure.

There being no further comments, the Motion passed with a unanimous vote.

Resolution 2013-003 Reflection of those living in poverty: (the full resolution can be found at Appendix IV)

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania, in accordance with the direction of General Convention, call upon the Diocese and its parishes to begin each meeting for the coming year with the question, "How will what we are doing here affect or involve those living in poverty?"

The Rev. Canon Kate Harrigan, St. Paul's, Harrisburg, representing the proposers of this resolution, explained that this resolution had been brought to General Convention by Episcopal deacons and it was absorbed into a larger resolution. At that point, the Episcopal Deacons pulled it out to call it the Deacons' Resolve to pay attention to those living in poverty, so that it would not get lost in the larger resolution that had absorbed it. Their strategy was then to ask dioceses to bring the resolution to their diocesan convention in order to raise awareness of those living in poverty. Several dioceses have voted on their form of this. Her parish of St. Paul's Harrisburg has been following this for their meetings and have found that it has changed their conversations and how they look at what they do as a parish. She noted that the resolution's main intention is to raise awareness.

There being no further comments, the resolution passed with a majority vote.

Resolution 2013-004 – Gun violence (The full resolution can be found at Appendix IV)

Be it resolved:

That the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania calls upon our elected officials at both the state and federal level to take immediate action to resolve this crisis by:

- Requiring background checks for all gun purchases and the elimination of any loopholes which allow disturbed individuals and criminals to more easily obtain firearms.
- Provide additional funding to help protect our schools to help keep them safe places of learning.
- Work to strengthen the mental health system and provide greater access for individuals with serious mental health issues.
- Join us in working to better educate the people of our region about mental health issues and work to erase the stigma of seeking care for mental illness.
- Seek to eliminate assault weapons and high capacity magazines which are better suited to warfare than to lawful pursuits like hunting.
- Join us in prayerfully asking God's help in creating a more peaceful and tolerant society where we can live in our homes and walk without fear on our streets.

And since the sisters and brothers who make up the Body of Christ (the Church) are called upon to engage in the spiritual formation of its members;

Be it further resolved that this Convention commission the Peace and Justice Committee to investigate Episcopal Peace Fellowship's Non-Violence training, and engage these and other resources to design non-violence training courses appropriate for all age groups for use in parishes and in Diocesan formation programs to be presented to Diocesan Convention in 2014.

The Rev. Robin Jarrell, St. Matthew's Sunbury, a co-sponsor, explained that they felt a need to address the cluster of symptoms that make up violence in this country. After the massacre at Sandy Hook, they felt compelled to do something and this resolution was a part of that. She conceded that the resolution may be imperfect but assured that it is heartfelt.

A request for further definitions was made regarding: 1- What does the resolve mean by "disturbed" people and 2- what does the resolve mean by "assault weapon"?

Rev. Jarrell explained that they understood "disturbed" to mean anybody who is classified as mentally ill. She understood assault weapons to be any weapon that can fire off repeated rounds to kill. Secretary of Convention Powell suggested that the resolution be limited to automatic weapons, as that is within framework and definition in most laws. He further suggested that mentally ill be defined as someone who has been diagnosed with a mental illness by a licensed psychologist.

The Rev. Susan Claytor moved that the resolution be amended to restructure the phrase: "where we can live in our homes and walk without fear on our streets" to read "live in our homes and walk on our streets without fear" so that the sentence would read grammatically and with greater clarity and effect. The motion to amend was seconded and passed by a majority vote.

The discussion returned to the entire resolution:

The Rev. Beth Mollard proposed a further amendment to the resolution, eliminating the phrase "disturbed individuals" as she saw this as being discriminatory and impossible to enforce.

The amendment was seconded.

The Rev. Stephen Harris spoke in opposition to the amendment. While he agreed that "disturbed individual" is a vague phrase in one sense, in his experience in mental health ministry, he knows that sometimes people are involuntarily committed because they are a danger to themselves and others. He also cited the situation where a protection from abuse order can be made against someone in a violent situation. He prefers to keep the amendment as it is and vote it up or down.

Mr. Alec Tallman, St. Paul's, Harrisburg and member of the Diocesan Youth delegation, spoke in favor of the amendment to have the "disturbed individual" phrase removed. He noted that the resolution does not state what "disturbed" is defined as, and without having a clear definition, there is no way to properly identify or help those individuals.

The vote was called on the amendment. The voice vote split, and a count was requested. Upon a count, the amendment passed with Ayes: 101 and Nays: 74

Discussion returned to the entire resolution.

Ms. Mary Frey, All Saints Williamsport, spoke in opposition to the resolution, saying that she didn't think this is a resolution that should be brought up at a church conference.

Mr. Chip Foulsham, St. Paul's, Lock Haven, noted that the Constitution gives freedom of religion and specifies the separation of church and state. He further noted that the 2nd Amendment gives citizens the right to bear arms. He did not think the church should dictate to the state what they should do about gun ownership.

Mr. Burt Myers, St. Andrew's York, who is employed by the PA Game Commission, spoke to the phrase: "seek to eliminate assault weapons and...." He clarified that in Pennsylvania it is illegal to use automatic and semi-automatic weapons for hunting, so he would like to see a change to language of the resolution to delete the reference to hunting. He called for a Motion for an amendment to read: "Seek to eliminate semi-automatic and automatic assault weapons and high capacity magazines" (thus eliminating language referencing hunting, etc.) The motion was seconded and there being no further comments, passed with a majority.

Discussion returned to the full resolution: Mr. Nick Marouf, St. Andrews Harrisburg noted that he is half in support of the resolution because the ideas expressed are good. However, he suggested eliminating the specific reference to assault weapons because crimes happen with all kinds of weapons. He brought a Motion to amend the resolution to strike the full line "seek to eliminate...."

The amendment was seconded but did not pass. The 20 minutes of debate time having expired, the Chair called the vote on the resolution, as amended. The voice vote was split and a hand count was requested. The resolution passed with Ayes: 144 and Nays: 49 (The final resolution can be found at Appendix IV).

Resolution 2013-005 – Non Compliance with Annual Fair Share (the full resolution can be found at Appendix IV)

Be it therefore resolved that:

- Beginning with the fiscal year 2014, the Treasurer and rector of any parish that does not pledge or pay their Fair Share for the fiscal year 2013 on a timely basis may be asked to meet with the Finance Committee and provide the reasons that the parish is either unwilling or unable to pay. Further, such parish shall provide the Finance Committee with a written 3 to 5-year plan demonstrating a method to come into compliance.
- The Finance Committee shall review such explanation and plans for compliance for reasonableness and make a recommendation to the Council of Trustees with regard to exoneration of such parish from the requirements of the Canons.
- Acceptable reasons for not meeting Fair Share obligations may include, but are not limited to:
 - Cost of capital improvements;

- Cost of starting a new program;
- Cost of hiring a parish personnel;
- Efforts that focus on helping the parish to grow.
- The recommendation by the Finance Committee may include the requirement that non-compliant parishes record the unpaid Fair Share amount on its balance sheet as a liability to the Diocese.
- Failure to meet with the Finance Committee and obtaining approval for non-compliance from the Council of Trustees may result in enforcement of Article III Section 2C of the Constitution of the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania.

The motion was seconded and the Rev. Canon Stephen Casey, a member of the Finance Committee, the proposer of the resolution, spoke to it to say that, as rector of a parish who didn't pay full fair share for a number of years, he likened paying the fair share to pledging in a parish. A rector and vestry can pray about it and persuade and encourage people to pledge, but people will or won't give as they wish. The Diocese is in a similar situation. The difference is that there are canons of the diocese and of national church, which have been agreed to by the lay and clergy of church, which need to pass by resolution. It is simple: diocese needs their share. If diocese was to actually impose the canons in place regarding payment of the fair share, many in attendance today wouldn't be here. Canon Casey was happy to report that his parish completed a five year plan they had worked out with the diocesan office and finance committee, and is now up to compliance.

A point of information was made to clarify the reference to 2013 and 2014 dates. Until 2014 we will not know if fair share was fully paid in 2013. So any potential request for information regarding 2013 would come in 2014. This will then carry forward into oncoming years, the resolution will not need to be brought to each convention.

It was noted that the request to discuss a parish's situation can come from either the diocesan office, finance committee, or the parish. Canon Babcock explained that the idea is that once a parish has pledged their fair share, they are encouraged to call the finance committee to talk. Or when diocese gets their monthly reports they may call parishes who seem to have a hard time. Sometimes a parish might call to say when it can again make full share. The idea of the resolution is to promote dialogue as opposed to imposing restrictions. He reminded parishes that if the diocesan office and finance committee know a parish is having difficulty, they might be able to help.

The Rev. Charlene Leigh Koser, St. Andrews York, asked if the diocese had ever imposed the canons as they stand. Bishop Baxter responded that it had not been done in recent memory as it is seen as too draconian. Rev Leigh Koser wondered if there is any use to the canon.

Bishop Baxter responded that other dioceses have done this. This resolution is being presented in our diocese because there has been push at convention that if people aren't willing to have the conversation and not pay, then it is not seen as fair that they have voice and vote. Parishes who consistently paid their fair share have pressed that we use canon. Finance committee preferred to do it this way instead. Canon Babcock explained that the resolution came about because of concern expressed that the canon is too draconian. Secretary Powell did a study of what dioceses around the country who are doing similar things and Rev. Currier did a study about what methods other diocese are using to get into compliance. This resolution builds on the more conversational and pastoral method that is used.

Ms. Dorothy Kapnic, St Andrew's, Harrisburg, expressed concern that the resolution has a mixture of "may" and "shall" in the language. She moved for an amendment:

To eliminate the second sentence in bullet point 1;

To eliminate all of bullet point 3; and

To eliminate bullet 4 because finance committee doesn't have the right to dictate to parishes how they present their financial statements.

The amendment was seconded and, there being no further discussion of the amendment, the vote was taken and the motion for amendment passed with a majority.

Discussion returned to the resolution itself: Father David Peck inquired if we have the capacity to put up on screen the amended document we will be voting on. We do not have this capability as yet so Rev. Chappell read the amended resolution.

The resolution, as amended, passed by a majority. (The final resolution can be found at Appendix IV)

Resolution 2013-006 – Voting Rights: (the full resolution can be found at Appendix IV)

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that this 143rd Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Central Pennsylvania shall by enactment of this resolution, urge the Gov. of this Commonwealth and all elected representatives to repeal the Voter ID Law, returning the process of registration and voting to pre- 2012 circumstances, recognizing that the Commonwealth has no history of voter impersonation fraud, even at such time as the current Governor was Attorney General for the commonwealth.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this 143rd Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Central Pennsylvania urge all persons of faith and communities of faith to join in this appeal to restore voting privileges to pre-2012 levels,

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this 143rd Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Central Pennsylvania urge our elected officials to cease any further efforts to restrict voting access and instead consider expanding the franchise opportunities by allowing registration up to and including the day of voting, expanding voting to include days preceding Election Days, including the weekend leading up to Election Days, and an open primary process to allow for greater participation by all registered voters in candidate nomination process.

The motion was seconded and the proposer was asked to speak to it. The proposer, The Rev. Elaine Silverstrim, was unable to attend and The Rev. Tom Reeder to spoke on her behalf.

He noted that questions had been raised whether or not it is appropriate to address a secular issue in a church gathering. However, we are a church who speaks on behalf of justice and those who are marginalized and disenfranchised, so it is appropriate. He asked that as delegates considered their vote, they remember Jonathan Daniels was murdered in 1965 in Alabama when working to register African American voters. It is appropriate to stand up as a church and raise a voice to say when something is immoral.

The Rev. Christian Brady, St. Andrew's State College, spoke in opposition to the resolution. While he has sympathy for intent of resolution, as stated it gets into the detailed minutae of a legislative proposal. It is our job to hold moral mirror up to society. A resolution with more general language to ask the government to be sure all have accessibility to vote is more appropriate. Details of how to implement it are best left to the civil process. He is not offering amendment to the language, but cannot support the resolution as written.

Mr. Tony Hatfield, St. Mark's Lewistown, explained that he is a judge of election at his polling place. They have requested people to show their identification and have had no problems; they automatically bring it out. People are used to showing their IDs.

The Rev. Janis Yskamp, Potter County Churches, noted that while the voter ID card is free and accessible to the majority, it is not to all Pennsylvanians. Many people in Potter and Tioga Counties, and others in that area have no access to public transportation. In those counties voter registration cards are only available at PennDOT offices one day a week and often not a day when transportation is available.

There were many senior citizens who did everything they could to get their cards but were unable to do so.

Mr. Terry Walker, St. John's Carlisle, asked 2 questions: if passed how would the results of the resolution be implemented? How do we urge all elected officials, all people of faith etc? Will it be done with mass mailing letters/ billboards/ads? Secondly, he suggested this is the wrong solution to the problem we are trying to solve. Why don't we instead start a mission to get ID cards for homeless persons and other such persons of need?

Bishop Baxter explained that in the past we have sent letters out electronically to elected officials.

The Rev. Stephen Harris, Prince of Peace, Gettysburg, proposed an amendment to delete the phrase "and an open primary process."

The motion for the amendment was seconded. Fr. Harris explained that the primary system is partisan so parties can elect their own people.

The vote on the amendment passed by a majority.

Discussion returned to the resolution in whole.

Mr. Chip Foulsham, Lock Haven, agreed that this is a secular decision and not for the church to make. He also reiterated the many times we need to show ID cards and do so with no problem.

One last argument in favor of the resolution was made, saying that it is not so easy for seniors to get their voter ID cards because they don't always have their original documents. He cited his elderly mother who did not have an original social security card and, even though she had her Medicare card had her social security number on it, it was not considered acceptable, and she was unable to get a voter card, despite many attempts to do so.

The vote was called on the resolution as amended. Although the resolution appeared to pass, a hand count was requested. The resolution passed with Ayes: 149 and Nays 41. (The final resolution can be found at Appendix IV).

The resolution discussion having concluded, Chancellor McLemore returned the gavel to Bishop Baxter. Bishop Baxter thanked the Chancellor, The Rev. Veronica Chappell and the Resolutions Committee for their good work.

Bishop Baxter went on to quote the Bishop of Durham: "diversity without enmity is a gift of the holy spirit", and thanked the convention delegates for conducting the debate without enmity.

Break: The meeting was adjourned for a ten minute break.

Announcement: The Rev. Jane Miron announced that delegates may return their green and red cards in the boxes at the exit doors so that they can be re-used next year.

Committee on the Bishop's Address: The Rev. Richard Wall, committee chair, presented the committee's report. (The full text of the resolution may be found at Appendix V.) He moved that the report and resolutions be accepted by the Convention, as presented

The motion was seconded and passed unanimously.

Courtesy Resolutions: The Rev. Canon Greg Hinton, Chair of the Courtesy Resolutions Committee presented the courtesy resolutions (the full text of the Courtesy Resolutions may be found at Appendix VI). He moved that the resolutions be accepted by Convention, as presented.

The motion was seconded and passed unanimously.

Appointment of time and date of next Convention: Canon Dan Selvage announced that the 144th Annual Convention of the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania is scheduled for June 13-14, 2014 at the same location.

Request to review matter of time and date of Convention. Canon Selvage then sought the concurrence of Convention to ask the Bishop to appoint a task force to review time and date of Convention. The motion was moved, seconded and passed unanimously.

Destroy Ballots Secretary Powell moved that, as all nominated positions on the ballots had been duly elected, the ballots should be destroyed. The motion was seconded and passed unanimously.

Closing Eucharist Bishop Baxter announced that, after short break to allow alternates and guests to join the delegates, the closing Eucharist would begin.

Motion to adjourn There being no further business, a motion was made to adjourn. The motion was seconded and passed unanimously.

IT'S GOOD TO BE BACK!

My sabbatical was great in many ways; re-entry has been a bit overwhelming. I received briefings Wednesday and Thursday; officiated at the wedding of former student on Saturday; and on Sunday morning, Mary Ellen and I had a warm and joyous visitation with St. Paul's Church, Columbia. Sunday evening, I had the great privilege of ordaining four persons to the Sacred Order of Deacons. Our Cathedral was packed! Clergy and laity from every Convocation in our diocese were present, as well as many of seminary colleagues and professors of the ordinands. I thank everyone for their attendance and support.

This week, the most urgent pastoral and administrative matters have been attended to; I've played catchup on the planning of Diocesan Convention, including working on my address. It's been a whirlwind reentry.

BUT, IT'S GOOD TO BE BACK AMONG YOU!

I return to a diocese that has continued to move forward in my absence. I wish to thank Canon Babcock, my staff and volunteer leaders who ably led the major commissions, committees and councils in my absence. The diocese was in good hands and has advanced since my absence.

Most of all, I wish to thank Bishop David Jones for his extraordinary pastoral presence, wise pastoral and administrative counsel, and spiritual grace throughout the diocese. While I have missed you, and you have said you missed me (smile), it has also been good for the diocese to experience the grace of another bishop of the Church.

Also, a **big thank-you** to the Lancaster Convocation for helping with the planning and hosting of this Convention. Working with diocesan staff, they developed this year's theme; planned the music and liturgies; and invited enough volunteers to participate to ensure warm and effective hospitality.

Finally, a heart-felt thank you to you all, the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania, for granting me this three-month sabbatical. It has been 15 years since my last one – far too long. I was in need of a season of refreshment, renewal and healing.

SABBATICAL REPORT

The goals of the sabbatical were to Learn, Discern, and Rest.

Learn: There is a part of my vocation that is academic and public. While episcopacy is by nature parochial – one's responsibility to shepherd a local region – I have missed the more academic and public side of my ministry. When planning this sabbatical over a year ago, it was my hope to exercise a bit of that aspect of my vocation unencumbered by other expressions of ministry I also love. There were interests that I wanted to explore – spirituality and preaching, and considering the history and current state of black Episcopalians in our Church. Two seminaries and a publisher offered me opportunities to claim these opportunities.

By the time of my illness in late summer I had already signed the contracts and spent the money! However, the research and writing flowed relatively freely. I appreciated being able to stop, rest and walk as needed while I worked.

The Lutheran Seminary in Philadelphia invited me to be a lecturer in their annual Preaching with Power series. This event is followed by a private dialogue with the faculty and student body. My lecture – on DVD – is available on the seminary's website.

The Virginia Theological Seminary invited me to offer the Martin Luther King, Jr., Lectures. The first lecture was public, and the second was for faculty and students, followed by discussion. The lectures are on the seminary's website in video form and as PDFs. Mary Ellen and I spent the rest of the week relaxing on the campus, taking in library exhibits, and talking with our seminarians. We then visited our daughter and her family who live about 30 minutes away from the seminary before returning home.

Westminster/Knox Press is publishing a new commentary on Gospel of John in its Feasting on the Gospel series to which I contributed two short homiletical articles.

The research, reflecting, writing and discussions truly renewed the "life of the mind" for me.

Discern. Many of you know that for many years a Jesuit priest at Wernersville Spiritual Center has been my Spiritual Director. Beloved Fr. Ed is now almost 90 and in poor health. For the last six months I have had a new spiritual director, an Episcopal priest who was formerly a Jesuit. So, the disciplines of Ignatius of Loyola continue to nurture me in this time of discerning the "new normal" for my health in body, mind and spirit.

Mary Ellen and I also found much healing at the local Episcopal congregation in the village of Tunis Mills. We have been attending this lovely little chapel for almost 20 years. All Faith Chapel is a congregation with a history going back to 1720, having begun as a chapel of ease for the mother church in St. Michaels (1692). The Chapel's heritage is also seen in its worship, which alternates between Holy Eucharist and Morning Prayer with sermon. Between 30 and 40 attend each Sunday, which causes the little chapel to look like a packed house. While our visits to the Eastern Shore are usually a week or a long weekend, this extended time was renewing as we had the opportunity to talk with old friends at coffee hour or on walks, many of whom we have known for quite some time. Their remembering us Sunday by Sunday in the Prayers of the People is a gift indeed.

The ministry of the priest there, The Rev. Abigail Nestlehutt, has also been a blessing. Her sermons, her visits and her prayer with us have been healing and revealing. We enjoy the fellowship of this close knit congregation and village.

Rest. We really rested while on the Eastern Shore. We love the wildlife – foxes, deer, and so many varieties of birds are all easily visible from the vantage point of our house.

During March and April, we split our time between the cottage and our home in Harrisburg. But the month of May was spent entirely on the Eastern Shore, where we enjoyed day trips to its quaint towns and patronized its seafood restaurants and historic sites, such as the Frederick Douglass Memorial in St. Michaels.

Our grandchildren love visiting us there and they also like the neighbors who let them ride with them on tractors.

Most of all, Mary Ellen and I enjoyed sitting in our rocking chairs reading, watching the birds and deer, and getting reacquainted.

So, I return better in body, mind and spirit than when I left. Energy-wise and endurance-wise, I'm not the man I was a year ago and my recovery clearly continues. Symptoms are better managed as doctors monitor medication. But this sabbatical has borne much fruit and has been a blessing to me. Whatever my "new normal" may be, I am deeply grateful for this gift of time; for your prayers for my health; and for this demonstration of your great love for me and Mary Ellen.

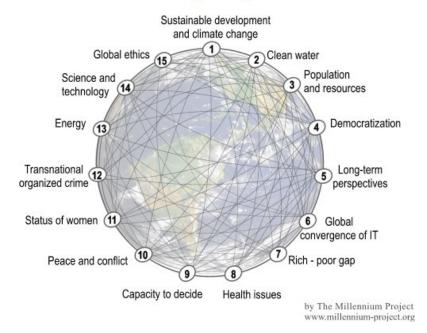

Global Challenges for Humanity – excerpted from 2009 State of the Future, Michael Marien, editor, *Future Survey*

15 Global Challenges facing humanity



The 15 Global Challenges provide a framework to assess the global and local prospects for humanity. Their description, with a range of views and actions to address each, enriched with regional views and progress assessments, have been updated each year since 1996 and published in the annual *State of the Future*.

The challenges are interdependent: an improvement in one makes it easier to address others; deterioration in one makes it harder to address others. Arguing whether one is more important than another is like arguing that the human nervous system is more important than the respiratory system. These challenges are transnational in nature and trans-institutional in solution. They cannot be addressed by any government or institution acting alone. They require collaborative action among governments, international organizations, corporations, universities, NGOs, and creative individuals.

Challenges for Pennsylvania

Issues-PA is an initiative of the Pennsylvania Economy League, Inc.

(August 2005) The latest U.S. Census Bureau population estimates aren't favorable for Pennsylvania. The increase over last year was just 0.3%, significantly lower than the nationwide increase of about 1%. Pennsylvania's total population has increased only 1% since the 2000 Census, compared to 4.4% nationally.

Will these trends persist? The Census Bureau predicts they will. Between 2000 and 2030, Pennsylvania's projected population increase will be the 6th lowest in the nation. Continued slow growth isn't good, but a closer look at the demographic changes raises even more concern. Consider the following table to see how Pennsylvania compares:

What do these numbers mean?

- Pennsylvania has a smaller percentage of youth than the country overall. The Census Bureau projects there will be 6% fewer people under 18 years old in Pennsylvania in 2030 than there were in 2000 - about 176,000 less.
- The percentage of working-age people will decrease nationwide, after a mild peak sometime around 2010. For Pennsylvania, that trend translates into 308,000 fewer working-age people in 2030 than in 2000, and a significant drop-off from 2020.
- Decreasing proportions of young and middle-aged people means there will be more older people in Pennsylvania. By 2030, despite minimal overall population growth, expect nearly 1 million more older people than in 2000. The nation is experiencing the same trend of increasing numbers of older persons as baby-boomers age - but not in proportion to total population. In Pennsylvania, the proportion of elderly to the total population will remain greater.

So what does an aging population mean for Pennsylvania public policy?

State and local governments provide services generally not furnished by the private sector but essential to the well-being of our society. The number of people demanding services and the number paying for them are at the heart of many government policy decisions. What are the implications of Pennsylvania's future demographics for the state and local government services?

Medicaid. Medicaid, or Medical Assistance as it's called in Pennsylvania, is among the largest and fastest growing programs in the state budget. While the elderly represent only 13% of all state medical assistance recipients, they consume more than a third of all resources. What impact will an increasing number of elderly - as well as higher overall health care costs - have on the already worrisome state Medical Assistance program?

Education. Fewer children should translate into smaller school districts and less demand for funding. While the school age population will decline statewide, this won't be the case in every school district. Patterns of uneven decline will create new challenges for distributing state education funding and delivering basic education, particularly in the most rural and urban areas. And in higher education, post-secondary enrollment will increase only 2% between 2000 and 2015. Will policymakers properly adapt Pennsylvania's school finance system to the realities of changing demographics?

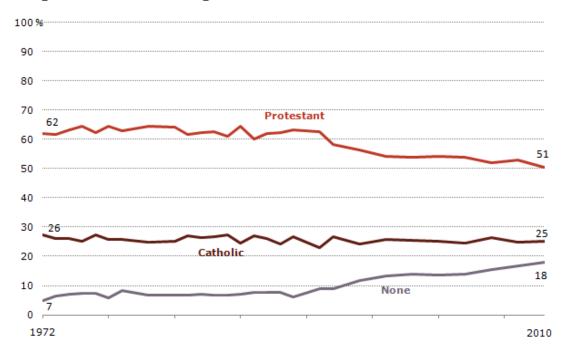
Corrections. An aging population should mean lower crime rates since the elderly commit fewer crimes than youth and young adults. Will the corrections system offer opportunities for lower-than-inflation growth rates, relieving some of the pressure on the state budget? Or will any potential savings be overcome by other factors such as rising health care costs of its own aging-in-place population?

TRENDS IN RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION

While the ranks of the unaffiliated have grown significantly over the past five years, the Protestant share of the population has shrunk. In 2007, 53% of adults in Pew Research Center surveys described themselves as Protestants. In surveys conducted in the first half of 2012, fewer than half of American adults say they are Protestant (48%). This marks the first time in Pew Research Center surveys that the Protestant share of the population has dipped significantly below 50%.

The decline is concentrated among white Protestants, both evangelical and mainline. Currently, 19% of U.S. adults identify themselves as white, born-again or evangelical Protestants, down slightly from 21% in 2007. And 15% of adults describe themselves as white Protestants but say they are not born-again or evangelical Christians, down from 18% in 2007. There has been no change in minority Protestants' share of the population over the past five years.

These findings represent a continuation of long-term trends. The General Social Surveys (GSS), conducted by the National Opinion Research Center at the University of Chicago for roughly four decades, show that the number of religiously unaffiliated adults remained below 10% from the 1970s through the early 1990s. The percentage of religiously unaffiliated respondents began to rise noticeably in the 1990s and stood at 18% in the 2010 GSS.

The Protestant share of the population, by contrast, has been declining since the early 1990s. In the GSS, about six-in-ten adults identified as Protestants in the 1970s and 1980s. By 2000, however, 54% of GSS respondents were Protestant. And in the 2010 GSS, 51% of respondents identified themselves as Protestants.

The Catholic share of the population has been roughly steady over this period, in part because of immigration from Latin America.

[The United States will be majority-minority nation by 2042. By 2050, the country will be 54 percent minority as the Latino population doubles.]

What Is Behind the Growth of the Religiously Unaffiliated?

Generational Replacement

One important factor behind the growth of the religiously unaffiliated is generational replacement, the gradual supplanting of older generations by newer ones. Among the youngest Millennials (those ages 18-22, who were minors in 2007 and thus not eligible to be interviewed in Pew Research Center surveys conducted that year), fully one-third (34%) are religiously unaffiliated, compared with about one-in-ten members of the Silent Generation (9%) and one-in-twenty members of the World War II-era Greatest

Generation (5%). Older Millennials (ages 23-30) also are substantially less likely than prior generations to be religiously affiliated.

But generational replacement is not the only factor at play. Generation Xers and Baby Boomers also have become more religiously unaffiliated in recent years. In 2012, 21% of Gen Xers and 15% of Baby Boomers describe themselves as religiously unaffiliated, up slightly (but by statistically significant margins) from 18% and 12%, respectively, since 2007. The trend lines for earlier generations are essentially flat. Not only are young adults less likely to be affiliated than their elders, but the GSS shows that the percentage of Americans who were raised without an affiliation has been rising gradually, from about 3% in the early 1970s to about 8% in the past decade. However, the overwhelming majority of the "nones" were brought up in a religious tradition.

The new Pew Research Center/Religion & Ethics News Weekly survey finds that about three-quarters of unaffiliated adults were raised with some affiliation (74%).

To be sure, the United States remains a highly religious country – particularly by comparison with other advanced industrial democracies – and some measures of religious commitment in America have held remarkably steady over the years. The number of Americans who currently say religion is very important in their lives (58%), for instance, is little changed since 2007 (61%) and is far higher than in Britain (17%), France (13%), Germany (21%) or Spain (22%).

However, a significant factor of which we are all increasingly aware is the growth of "The Nones".

January 13, 2013 Heidi Glenn interviewed Harvard professor Robert Putnam, who writes about religion. Putnam says, this young generation has been distancing itself from community institutions and from institutions in general.

"They're the same people who are also not joining the Elks Club or the Rotary Club," Putnam tells Greene. "I don't mean to be casting that as a critique of them, but this same younger generation is much less involved in many of the main institutions of our society than previous younger generations were."

The trend, Putnam says, is borne out of rebellion of sorts. "It begins to jump at around 1990," he says. "These were the kids who were coming of age in the America of the culture wars, in the America in which religion publicly became associated with a particular brand of politics, and so I think the single most important reason for the rise of the unknowns is that combination of the younger people moving to the left on social issues and the most visible religious leaders moving to the right on that same issue."

But, "Religion still rules in America," as Putnam tells Greene. "Even with these recent changes the American religious commitments are incredibly stronger than in most other advanced countries in the world," Putnam says. "The average American is slightly more religious than the average Iranian, so we are a very religious country even today."

Now here is my challenge to us, you and me, the Episcopal Church in Central Pennsylvania.

Just as Michael Marien, editor, Future Survey, asked the question, Are Pennsylvanians up for the challenge? As your Bishop I ask: "Are Episcopalians in the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania up for the challenge?"

I believe we have already begun meeting the Challenge through our inheritance with active institutional ministries:

- Episcopal Home (for Elderly), Shippensburg;
- > Episcopal Square (for disabled), Shippensburg;

- > Episcopal Commons (low income apartments), Thompsontown;
- > Episcopal Gardens: Thompsontown.

Then there is the ongoing work of direct services and education in the Diocese:

- The work of the Operation Understanding (human services grants);
- Mission Grants to local congregations (Congregational Development Commission);
- St. Barnabas Ministry, (joint inner-city children's ministry with Lutherans) at St. Paul's, Harrisburg;
- St. Stephen's School (pre-K—8) at the Cathedral, Harrisburg;
- Trinity Pro-Cathedral's Ex-Offenders Program (Williamsport).

MOVING FORWARD AND LIVING THE GOSPEL FOR TOMORROW

Based on these long time ministries of which we jointly partner there are new commitments developing. Convocation plenary summary reports from our fall 2012/spring 2013 gatherings revealed much about how the people of our diocese seek to embrace God's future and live into the Gospel for tomorrow. Ranked in frequency and emphasis, here is what you said in my absence:

First theme: Gathering. Making connections one to another through relationships. How can we be a resource to each other in these extreme times? We deepen and strengthen relationships through convocation gatherings by:

- Listening to each other's stories; enjoying retreat time together; shared formation opportunities
- Intentionally gathering more frequently with a specific mission/purpose to take time to look backward, dream forward, and let the moment lead us into our call.
- Gather as ministry groups, such as youth ministries: camp, conferences, acolytes, choirs; and children's ministries: acolytes, church school, Godly Play
- Commission on music and liturgy
- Intentionally have smaller group gatherings within the convocations between our spring/fall meetings. Includes events such as Clergy Clericuses and Safe Church.

Second Theme: Responding

Create new opportunities within the convocation that are: Organic and Spirit-led for mission and for formation, including:

- Worship for the whole convocation pulpit exchanges, gifts exchanges
- Senior wardens work together
- Development of Convocational enterprise zone ideas
- Youth mission work done collaboratively RIM, for example.
- Confirmations in convocation format, including preparation

Third Theme: Sent out

- 1. Purposeful and intentional communication of Good News stories, "best use of technology" through convocational newsletters/web page/blogs that connect us one to another.
- 2. Congregations post the name of the university where their senior high school graduates are beginning their college years.
- 3. Congregational visitation by laity traveling to different congregations throughout the convocation

Examples of Diocesan responses to current needs:

Peace and Justice: Gun Control, Environmental Awareness and Action (including clean water and issues related to Marcellus Shale). Recently, letters have been sent to state and federal legislators and educational opportunities offered at local and diocesan levels. Provoked gun disasters in places like Newtown, Connecticut we have begun conversations with elected leaders and our communities.

Disaster Relief, Community Outreach: Hurricanes Katrina and Sandy:

- Youth work mission trip to Diocese of Long Island
- > Deacon's (Dioceses of CPA & N.J.) Christmas Project to New Jersey;
- ➤ Lancaster Convocation-wide cleaning supply project to New Jersey;
- ECW: Welcome Baskets for persons in New Jersey and New York returning to their homes after Sandy;

International ministries in the Diocese:

- Uganda: Masereka Foundation [ECW and Parishes];
- Sudan: Torit's Diocesan center and lighting,
- San Paulo: Local Parishes leading mission events.

Local/Regional Ministries:

- Mission Fairs: (Including PB's visit) astounding work of local parishes.
- Locally: RIM Churches Work Masses
- Mansfield: Weekly Local Growers Market

Another source of discernment regarding "The Gospel for Tomorrow is our recent DIOCESAN EFFECTIVENESS REVIEW:

- Leadership Development for ordained and lay leaders. There was affirmation for training initiatives such as Warden's Conference, School of Christian Studies, Safe Church, Antiracism, Clergy Wellness
- Youth (Staff commitment)
- Communication (Parish and community; Diocese and parishes, and Public Media; TEC)
- Evangelism (Enterprise Mission Centers)

The Episcopal Church in Central Pennsylvania is clearly determined to meet the challenge. For it is not just the challenge of circumstance, but it is the Challenge of Jesus for us to live into a vision of the Kingdom of God revealed in the Gospel.

The future will be challenging, but the faith of Jesus Christ and the faithful have always had their greatest witness in challenging times.

Most essential is what we believe about Jesus in such times. Jesus still asks, "Who do you say that I am??? Let's look at the letter to the Hebrews for a response:

Those to whom the author of Hebrews is writing seem to have begun to doubt whether Jesus could really be the Messiah for whom they were waiting, because the Messiah was prophesied in the Old Testament to come as a militant king and destroy the enemies of his people. Jesus, however, came as a mere man who suffered and even died under crucifixion. And although he was seen resurrected, he still left the earth and his people, who now face persecution rather than victory. The letter to the Hebrews addresses this problem by arguing that the Old Testament also foretold that the Messiah would be a priest (although of a different sort than the traditional Levitical priests) and Jesus came to fulfill this role. His role of a king is yet to come, and so those who follow him should be patient and not be surprised that they suffer for now.

Death is not the end, but a beginning! "Not just life, but the way of doing things. If we struggle to keep things as they are then it is our agenda not God's mission which is most important to us. We are

Resurrection people." (Taken from "Resurrection only works on dead things," by the Right Rev. Kate Waynick, Bishop of Indianapolis.)

"For the one who sanctifies and those who are sanctified all have one Father. For this reason Jesus is not ashamed to call them brothers and sisters." — Hebrews 2:11

"Therefore, brothers and sisters, holy partners in a heavenly calling, consider that Jesus, the apostle and high priest of our confession, was faithful to the one who appointed him..." — Hebrews 3:1-2

So, we keep ministering and living in the spirit of Christ Jesus, our brother in the service of God's Kingdom-work on Earth.

Summarily, we must trust that God still holds us and the world with loving hands: Spiritual hands, but also hands that look strangely human – incarnate hands like yours and mine. Yes, he's got the whole world in his hands. So join me in affirming that God is with us in strength and love; that no matter our successes or failures, He's Got the Whole World in His Hands.

RESOLUTION 001: ON CLERGY COMPENSATION SUBCOMMITTEE

WHEREAS, it is important for both the health of the diocese that our clergy have healthy lives to enable healthy congregations and a healthy diocese, and

WHEREAS, our diocese has clergy from all backgrounds working at different size parishes and other ministries in locales all across central Pennsylvania, and

WHEREAS, The Episcopal Clergy Association of Central Pennsylvania is the body exists to represent all of the ordained in our diocese; therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That the Episcopal Clergy Association respectfully recommends that the Bishop consider appointing a member of the Clergy Association, selected by that Association, to the Diocesan Subcommittee on Clergy Compensation.

RESOLUTION 002: ON CHURCH EMPLOYEE COMPENSATION

WHEREAS, there is a continuing need to emphasize the importance of an appropriate salary and adequate total compensation for clergy and laity of the diocese; and

WHEREAS, there is a need for total clergy and lay compensation to be appropriate in relationship to other dioceses; and

WHEREAS, Government guidelines instruct the (a) clergy be issued Form W-2 (not form 1099), and (b) professional allowance be separated from stipend and managed according to an Accounts Reimbursable plan with their employer; and

WHEREAS, the Diocese continues to face a continued increase in the number of congregations unable to sustain full time ordained ministry thus necessitating re-examination of how best to compensate ordained leadership at the congregational level; and

WHEREAS, the Subcommittee on Clergy Compensation has been instructed to review compensation annually and provide information and counsel to congregations, clergy, and the Diocese of compensation matters as needed; therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That the following clergy and lay employee compensation policy be adopted by the Diocese, and that the diocesan convention review this policy in 2015, having been advised by the Standing Committee and the Finance Committee Joint Subcommittee on Clergy and Lay Employee Compensation and Benefits.

Diocese of Central Pennsylvania Clergy and Lay Employee Compensation Schedule

A. Compensation Schedule

Full-time priests and transitional deacons shall be paid a salary that is at least equal to the salary established by the Diocesan Minimum Salary Schedule. The schedule provides higher rates of compensation based on the number of years of full-time ministry completed since ordination to the diaconate. Increases will be set in the Minimum Salary Schedule for 0-4 years, 5-9 years, 10-14 years, 15-24 years, and 25-plus years Other factors including relevant advanced degree (beyond the M.Div.) and specific relevant certification should be considered by parishes when setting salaries. Any clergyperson who is not receiving minimum compensation schedule should be considered part time and responsibilities negotiated accordingly. See G.

Lay persons employed full or part time shall be paid a salary that is at least equal to the minimum hourly wage prevalent in their area.

B. Cost of Living Adjustment

A Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA) will be made to each step of the Diocesan Yearly Minimum Salary Schedule.

C. Medical Insurance

In compliance with the mandate from General Convention, clergy or lay people working 20 or more hours per week must be covered by medical insurance. We offer the following medical plans to employees of our parishes and the diocese through the Medical Trust:

^{*} As part of the diocesan effort to contain health insurance costs for our parishes in light of the mandates of the Denominational Health Plan reaffirmed by General Convention 2012, the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania has made the **Empire PPO 80/60 the standard offering** for all parish and diocesan employees, including clergy. If an individual was previously enrolled in the Empire HighOpt PPO and wishes to remain so, he or she may do so by making up the difference between the premium for Empire PPO 80/60 and the premium for Empire HighOpt PPO.

D. Social Security Contribution

The full employer's share of the social security tax is to be paid for all employees.

E. Professional Expense Reimbursement

Vestries are encouraged to review annually with their clergy the actual expenditures incurred in the practice of ministry and to budget accordingly. The **minimum** professional expense reimbursement will be \$5,000, including travel reimbursed at the current rate allowed by the Internal Revenue Service. Such reimbursements are paid with an accountable reimbursement form.

G. Continuing Education

Full-time clergy receive an allowance of a minimum of \$750 annually for continuing education. Monies not used for continuing education will be allowed to accumulate up to 3 years, for special education projects, including sabbaticals.

Sabbatical Leave regulations are as follows:

It is the policy of the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania that all full-time clergy who have served continuously in this diocesan position or parish for seven years or more are entitled for sabbatical leave of up to three months. Sabbatical leave shall be in addition to vacation. While on sabbatical leave the member of the clergy shall receive full compensation and benefits. The right to request such leave shall recur each additional seven years' tenure.

A sabbatical plan of study is to be submitted to, and approved by, the vestry and the Bishop. Clergy are expected to return to their former position for at least one year following the conclusion of a sabbatical leave. Exceptions to this may only be granted by the Bishop with the concurrence of the vestry(ies) of the congregation(s) in which the clergy person is serving. Clergy shall not be eligible for more than one sabbatical leave in a seven year period, nor shall they be eligible for study leave in the same calendar year in which they take a sabbatical. When available, diocesan financial aid will be given to help with the costs of supply clergy for pastoral duties and the leadership of worship during the time of the sabbatical. The congregation or institution shall pay the cost of compensation and benefits. Clergy are expected to pay for the cost of the sabbatical itself; however efforts will be made to assist members of the clergy to obtain grants or other forms of financial aid.

2014 Minimum Clergy Compensation

The minimum clergy compensation schedule is listed below.

Years Ordained as of 1/I/14 Minimum Salary

0 – 4	\$39,658
5 – 9	\$43,492
10 – 14	\$46,052
15 – 24	\$49,598
25 – plus	\$52,233

Minimum salary guidelines are not meant to be considered in lieu of a merit increase. Every parish should be in dialogue with their clergy concerning evaluating responsibilities, performance and compensation annually.

Additional minimum benefits provided by congregations for full-time clergy include:

- 1) Housing is to be provided either **a**) cash allowance or, **b**) provided through a rectory in which case a \$1,100 equity allowance is to be given. This equity allowance is to be reviewed by the compensation committee annually.
- 2) Church Pension Fund Premiums.
- 3) Life insurance coverage of \$100,000 provided by the Church Insurance Company to clergy employed full-time at no extra cost to the congregation.

- 4) Clergy are to be covered by worker's compensation insurance.
- 5) Long-term 25 disability insurance coverage offered through Church Medical Trust is encouraged as well.

H. Part-time clergy

Based on a full-time week of 44 hours and diocesan standards for years of service, congregations will provide compensation including housing for the work of part-time clergy in proportion to mutually-agreed-upon hours of service.

Professional expenses to be reimbursed proportionately according to Section C of this resolution. The congregation and the ordained person may negotiate for greater reimbursement as part of the total compensation package.

Minimum health insurance coverage proportionate to the hours worked. The congregation and the ordained person may negotiate for greater coverage as part of the total compensation package. Clergy persons eligible for Medicare, CHAMPUS or similar federal or state insurance programs will receive a proportionate share of "medigap" insurance.

Continuing Education and Sabbatical leave proportionate to compensation contracted work time. Vacation time of at least four Sundays a year.

Clergy employed by two or more congregations to make a full-time job shall receive full-time salary and benefits as negotiated by the churches served.

I. Supply Clergy

The stipend for supply clergy is \$150 for one service and \$175 for two services. Beyond two services a day, the rate is to be negotiated. Mileage is to be reimbursed at the current rate allowed by the Internal Revenue Service.

J. Vocational Deacon Reimbursement

Mileage for church business conducted by vocational deacons is to be reimbursed at the current rate allowed by the Internal Revenue Service. In addition, a minimum continuing education allowance of \$500 as well as a \$300 professional expense reimbursement is to be provided. These reimbursements are to be reviewed annually by the Diocesan Compensation Committee.

K. Retired Clergy Insurance

As part of the benefits offered through Church Pension, retired clergy are offered supplemental insurance for Medicare. The comprehensive supplement is now included with retired clergy benefits. Two other levels of supplemental coverage are also available at additional cost. While it is the responsibility of clergy to purchase Medicare supplement for their spouse, the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania has helped retired clergy obtain one of the higher supplemental overages for themselves. At present the Diocese provides monetary assistance toward this cost for the clergy.

L. Lay Employees

Recent actions of General Convention have set standards by which all entities within the Episcopal Church are expected to follow with regard to lay employment practices. It is required that lay employees who work one thousand or more hours per year be provided with pension benefits after one year of service. In addition:

- 1) Those employees twenty one years old and older and working 1000 hours may begin a 403b defined contribution plan immediately upon hiring.
- 2) All employees working 1500 hours annually are to be offered health insurance coverage. Each parish may set up its own cost sharing plan. Arrangements for health insurance

should be made through the Diocesan plans. Diocesan guidelines are available on these matters.

- 3) An agreement also should be reached with those employees on life insurance, paid holidays, vacation and sick leave.
- 4) Worker's compensation must be paid for all employees.
- 5) Further, it is encouraged that short-term disability insurance be obtained for lay employees as well.

WHEREAS The Association for Episcopal Deacons urges our Church to reclaim its purpose as an institution of mission and service, believing that intentional conversation, reflection, and prayer will help us to focus on those who are living in poverty, much as Jesus did in His ministry,

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania, in accordance with the direction of General Convention, call upon the Diocese and its parishes to begin each meeting for the coming year with the question, "How will what we are doing here affect or involve those living in poverty?"

Be it resolved:

That the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania calls upon our elected officials at both the state and federal level to take immediate action to resolve this crisis by:

- Requiring background checks for all gun purchases and the elimination of any loopholes which allow disturbed individuals and criminals to more easily obtain firearms.
- Provide additional funding to help protect our schools to help keep them safe places of learning.
- · Work to strengthen the mental health system and provide greater access for individuals with serious mental health issues.

- Join us in working to better educate the people of our region about mental health issues and work to erase the stigma of seeking care for mental illness.
- Seek to eliminate assault weapons and high capacity magazines which are better suited to warfare than to lawful pursuits like hunting.
- Join us in prayerfully asking God's help in creating a more peaceful and tolerant society where we can live in our homes and walk without fear on our streets.

And since the sisters and brothers who make up the Body of Christ (the Church) are called upon to engage in the spiritual formation of its members;

Be it further resolved that this Convention commission the Peace and Justice Committee to investigate Episcopal Peace Fellowship's Non-Violence training, and engage these and other resources to design non-violence training courses appropriate for all age groups for use in parishes and in Diocesan formation programs to be presented to Diocesan Convention in 2014.

RESOLUTION 005: NON-COMPLIANCE WITH ANNUAL FAIR SHARE PROGRAM

Whereas, an increasing number of parishes in the Episcopal Diocese of Central Pennsylvania have either been unwilling or unable to pay their annual Fair Share on a timely basis; and

Whereas, the Diocese desires to establish a dialogue and consistent steps and procedures to work with parishes who are unwilling or unable to pay their annual Fair Share in order to recommend to Convention whether to exonerate such parishes and allow representation at Convention.

Be it therefore resolved that:

- Beginning with the fiscal year 2014, the Treasurer and rector of any parish that does not pledge or pay their Fair Share for the fiscal year 2013 on a timely basis may be asked to meet with the Finance Committee and provide the reasons that the parish is either unwilling or unable to pay.

Further, such parish shall provide the Finance Committee with a written 3 to 5 year plan demonstrating a method to come into compliance.

- The Finance Committee shall review such explanation and plans for compliance for reasonableness and make a recommendation to the Council of Trustees with regard to exoneration of such parish from the requirements of the Canons.
- Acceptable reasons for not meeting Fair Share obligations may include, but are not limited to:
 - Cost of capital improvements;
 - Cost of starting a new program;
 - Cost of hiring a parish personnel;
 - Efforts that focus on helping the parish to grow.
- The recommendation by the Finance Committee may include the requirement that non-compliant parishes record the unpaid Fair Share amount on its balance sheet as a liability to the Diocese.
- Failure to meet with the Finance Committee and obtaining approval for non-compliance from the Council of Trustees may result in enforcement of Article III Section 2C of the Constitution of the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania.

Background:

- The Episcopal Diocese of Central Pennsylvania is a communion of 66 interconnected and innerdependant parishes that are bonded together as a constituent part of The Episcopal Church and governed by the Constitution and Canons of The Episcopal Church and of the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania.
- These parishes are also bonded by faith and affection so that each may build upon the other's strengths and gifts to God's glory.
- The governing body of the Diocese is the Council of Trustees (COT). The COT included the Bishop, Diocesan officers, the President of the Standing committee, representatives of the Episcopal Churchwomen and the Youth Advisory Board, the seven Convocation Convenors and six members elected by General Convention three clergy and three lay.
- The COT has established a Diocesan Finance Committee. Among the duties of the Finance Committee is to develop and recommend a Fair Share formula to be reviewed/ edited/modified and ultimately approved by the COT.
- The Fair Share formula approved by the COT is discussed with and submitted for approval by The Diocesan Convention. Annual Convention includes lay and ordained people representation from every parish.
- The COT, the Finance Committee and Convention are forums where everyone in the Diocese can have input and such input is sought.
- Although the Fair Share has been overwhelmingly approved each year by the Diocesan Convention, an increasing number of parishes have either not paid their annual Fair Share allocation or have not paid on a timely basis.
- The Constitution and Canons provide that representation at Convention shall be denied to any Parish that fails to pay its Diocesan Fair Share unless exonerated by the Convention.
- The Diocese wants to be in dialogue with each and every parish that is unable or unwilling to pay the Fair Share and to establish a procedure to address this issue on a consistent basis.

- The Finance Committee shall review such explanation and plans for compliance for reasonableness and make a recommendation to the Council of Trustees with regard to exoneration of such parish from the requirements of the Canons.

- Failure to meet with the Finance Committee and obtaining approval for non-compliance from the Council of Trustees may result in enforcement of Article III Section 2C of the Constitution of the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania.

RESOLUTION 006: VOTING RIGHTS

WHEREAS we, the citizens of the United States, residing in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, have sadly witnessed increasing legislative assaults on the right of all persons aged eighteen (18) and older, to vote.

AND WHEREAS the Voter Id Law enacted in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in March or 2012, continues to be disputed, but is nonetheless an enacted law, currently blocked while pending judicial consideration,

AND WHEREAS the free and open expression of religion is guaranteed by the 1st Amendment to our Constitution, and the Right to Vote has been expanded and articulated in no less than FOUR amendments to our Constitution, (XV, XIX, XXIV & XXVI),

AND WHEREAS the free and open ability to worship is best protected in the context of a vibrant and open electoral process which encourages all persons to vote who are constitutionally eligible to vote,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that this 144th Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Central Pennsylvania shall by enactment of this resolution, urge the Gov. of this Commonwealth and all elected representatives to repeal the Voter ID Law, returning the process of registration and voting to pre- 2012 circumstances, recognizing that the Commonwealth has no history of voter impersonation fraud, even at such time as the current Governor was Attorney General for the commonwealth,

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this 144th Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Central Pennsylvania urge all persons of faith and communities of faith to join in this appeal to restore voting privileges to pre- 2012 levels,

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this 144th Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Central Pennsylvania urge our elected officials to cease any further efforts to restrict voting access and instead consider expanding the franchise opportunities by allowing registration up to and including the day of voting, expanding voting to include days preceding Election Days, including the weekend leading up to Election Days, and an open primary process to allow for greater participation by all registered voters in candidate nomination process.

Report of the Bishop's Address Committee

The Rev. Richard Wall presenting the Report and Resolutions on the Bishop's Address to the 143rd Convention of the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania.

WHEREAS we are united and led by the Right Reverend Nathan Baxter, whose episcopacy is empowered and fulfilled in the love, support and prayer of the people of his diocese;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that this 143rd Convention of the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania embraces, encourages, supports and affirms the leadership and ministry of our Bishop Diocesan as the Chief Missioner of the Diocese; his work with Program Groups and Commissions, churches and individuals; and his ministry of shepherding God's people through present challenges and opportunities and into God's future. We joyfully welcome his return from a season of Sabbatical, and enthusiastically receive his address to this 143rd Convention.

WHEREAS we live in an age of global transition and challenge;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that we recommit ourselves as a diocese to form an intentional Christian response to global challenges, and claim the responsibilities given to the members of Christ's body to build a world of justice and peace through prayer and action.

WHEREAS demographic data clearly demonstrate Pennsylvania's evolving population trends – with particular emphasis on growth in the number of seniors, a decline in youth, and economic implications of the same:

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that we will not ignore or resist statistical evidence, but respond strategically to the new challenges God sets before this state and diocese, adapting ourselves appropriately, as the surrounding culture and population evolve.

WHEREAS the number of our sisters and brothers without religious affiliation steadily increases, and the Protestant share of the population decreases;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that we carefully study the pastoral and spiritual needs of both the unaffiliated and those without any faith foundation or formation, develop faith communities with intentional invitational ministries to the unchurched, and vigorously commit ourselves to responding to this challenge.

WHEREAS every diocese is a single body: a complex, interconnected organism, despite challenges of geography, size and distance;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that we eagerly embrace all efforts to build and strengthen relationships that form our common life, especially by cultivating the role and activity of Convocations, the multitude of ministry and mission possibilities contained therein, and inter-parish cooperation in forming shared visions of service to local communities and populations.

WHEREAS God calls us to firmly face the needs and challenges of the Gospel of tomorrow;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that we will respond purposefully, intentionally, and fearlessly to the circumstances and needs of the future. We recommit ourselves to an openness to change, as and when God's call demands. Death will not scare or alarm, but rather enable us to see new opportunities and resurrection, as we trust in our God who delivered Christ through death to new life, and now leads us into His future with love and hope.

The Committee on the Bishop's Address respectfully requests that this 143rd Convention accept and adopt these resolutions in response to our Bishop's Address.

Report of the Finance Committee of the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania to the 143rd Diocesan Convention

The Diocesan Finance Committee maintains general supervision of the financial affairs of the Diocese and to act as advisor to the Bishop and the Treasurer in financial matters. It also is responsible for presenting a budget to the Council of Trustees for their approval and then presents this budget to the Annual Diocesan Convention.

The proposed budget for Fiscal Year 2014 is attached to this report. In formulating the proposed budget, the Finance Committee sought to be mindful on the continuing economic challenges facing our parishes. In a slowly recovering economy, all church institutions have had to examine their respective budgets carefully, always being mindful that the ultimate purpose for our financial resources is the proclamation of the Gospel of Christ.

The core of the diocesan budget remains the FairShare contributions made by the parishes of the diocese. The Committee takes note of and is grateful to the number of parishes that strive to meet their full FairShare request. Similarly, the Committee is also aware that special challenges face some of our parishes in both short and long term circumstances. The Committee continues to seek the best way forward in helping parishes to meet their respective needs while encouraging a thriving program of mission and ministry.

To this end, funding opportunities through diocesan grants and loans continue to plan an integral part in the financial support the diocese gives our parishes. As the attached budget narrative indicates, these efforts form a key strategy in strengthening the fabric of the diocesan Church. In particular, the Committee is pleased to report that all parishes have continued to act responsibly in the repayment of their loans from The Bishop Heistand Loan Fund. An increase in allocations for Congregational Development Commission Operating Projects Grants, the funding of four Enterprise Mission Zones, support for graduating seminarians as deacons and curates within the diocese are all key elements in this strategy. Similarly, the Committee has decreased allocations wherever possible to achieve as balanced an approach as possible in this difficult area of decision making.

This being stated, The Finance Committee offers for adoption the following resolution in relation to the budget for Fiscal year 2014:

WHEREAS: The Diocesan Council of Trustees meeting at its meeting in February 2013 evaluated the various requests by commissions and programs to be supported through the 2014 operating budget of the Diocese and at the time discussed and indicated priorities as to which programs to support and at which levels, and

WHEREAS: The Finance Committee has reviewed those priorities as well as the economic climate in which the Diocese currently operates, and has drafted a proposed expense and income budget that reflects the same; now therefore

BE IT RESOLVED: That the budget for Fiscal Year 2014 as is herein reported be approved and adopted by this 143rd Diocesan Convention.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That all parishes of this Diocese be requested in 2014 to accept a pledge of 12% of the first \$40,000 four year average of net operating income, 14% of \$40,001 to \$80,000 four year average of net operating income, and 18% of \$80,001 and above four year average of net operating income as indicated in this report, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That all parishes and congregations pay one twelfth of their Fair Share each month.

INTRODUCTION

The budget proposed in this report reflects a continuing effort to bring the budgeting process into line with two key elements:

- 1. Reorganization of the diocese to reflect an increased responsiveness to the ever-changing demands of ministry in the 21st Century.
- 2. Implementation of an outcomes based planning process that includes ongoing measurement and effectiveness evaluations for all aspects of diocesan mission and ministry.

One important aspect of this effort is the continuing reorganization of the Chart of Accounts, which attempts to show related revenue and expenditures within the strategic adopted for the mission and ministry of the diocese. In the proposed budget for Fiscal Year 2014 (FY 2014), you will see several changes from the groupings used in previous years. For example, under the Office of Bishop, the costs associated with the Diocesan Office Building at 101 Pine Street in Harrisburg, have been segregated into a new category called "Facilities Expenses." Until a totally new chart of accounts can be created, current accounts will retain their identification number (e.g. 01-12345) so that comparisons to previous years can be made when necessary.

Some accounts may appear to be "missing" (e.g. Operation Understanding, Episcopal Relief and Development). These accounts are "missing" only in the sense that they are no longer represented in the Operational Budget. In the general accounting scheme, such accounts will now be classified under "Other Income" and "Other Expenses" so they that do not influence the level of Revenue/Expenditure in the budget. This action was taken for all accounts that reflect "money in" and "money out" - that is revenue that is received by the diocese and transmitted to organizations outside the diocese or disbursed by committees within the diocese with no net effect on the operational budget of the diocese.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

As the budget process conforms itself to the strategic directions undertaken by the diocese, several things become clear:

- 1. Decreasing resources at the parish level have a direct impact upon the capacity of the diocese to provide services above and beyond its core activities.
- 2. Reflecting the circumstances of the church at the parish level, diocesan commissions and councils must frequently make difficult choices concerning how resources will be allocated in light of desired outcomes.
- 3. Recognition that the diocese truly subsists in its parishes, the primary strategic question under which its operations are organized and evaluated is: How does this endeavor strengthen the life and ministry of each and every parish?
- 4. Cultures of mission and ministry throughout the diocese vary widely, highlighting the importance of reinvigorating convocations or creating other lower level groupings that complement the mission and ministry of the parishes.

As a result, the diocesan budget seeks to allocate resources in such manner as to:

- 1. Provide support and resources for parish based efforts to enhance the mission and ministry of the Church in Central Pennsylvania.
- 2. Secure a pool of well trained clergy and lay ministers for parishes, especially when traditional models of ministry are no longer possible or desirable.
- 3. Provide services and programs that assist parishes in areas of ministry when parishes, because of demographic or fiscal resources, may not be able to provide these services themselves.
- 4. Recognize the interdependence of parishes as a genuine communion that gives rise to the diocese and is represented by the Office of the Bishop and the Bishop's staff.

DIOCESAN VISION STATEMENT

We live out our call to mission in ways that nurtures, advocates for and prepares our children, youth and young adults for lifelong formation in church leadership.

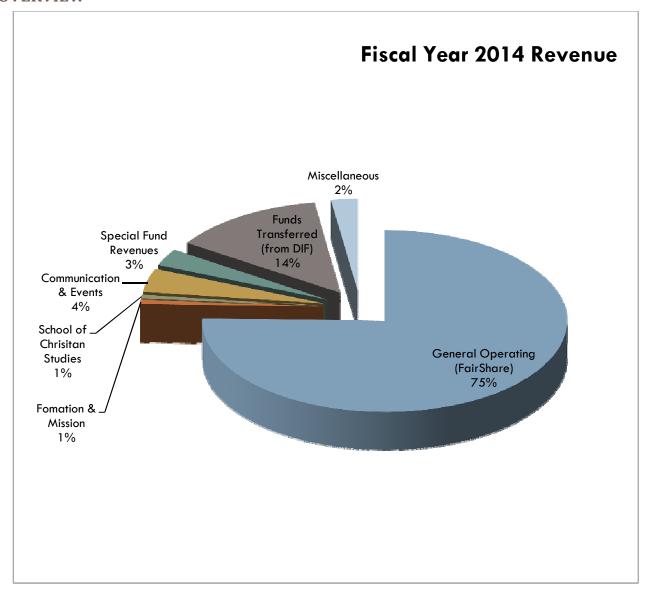
Leadership Formation

We will provide all people and parishes of the diocese with opportunities to prepare and be formed so live out the Baptismal Covenant in the "Spirit of Mission."

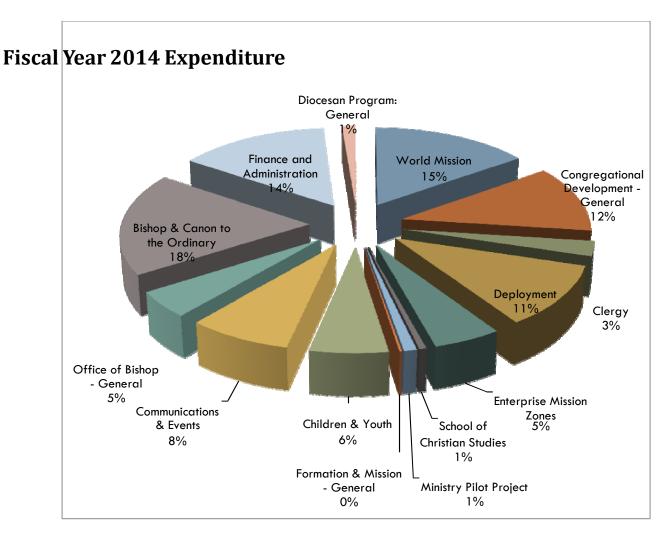
PROCESS

The budget planning process continues to be revised to reflect the key elements noted above. For FY 2014, budget requests were submitted to the relevant commission (e.g., Formation and Mission). Once received, each commission examined and prioritized the requests in light of the strategic directions of the diocese. Each commission shared their findings with the Council of Trustees and the Bishop's Office for consideration in constructing the proposed budget. These findings were collated by the Office of Finance and Diocesan Administration and presented to the Finance Committee. The Finance Committee recommended the proposed budget in its present form to the Council of Trustees for its approval and ultimately the approval of the diocese when gathered in Diocesan Convention on June 8, 2013.

 - Work has just begun.
 - Christ Church, Williamsport
 - Work is ongoing and has been wildly successful to date.
 - GLEAM, Williamsport
 - Work is ongoing.
 - St. Benedict's. New Freedom
 - Work is just beginning and they are filled with the spirit.
 - St. Luke's, Altoona
 - A very difficult situation with much conflict.
 - St Andrew's, State College
 - Initial work completed and they are moving thoughtfully forward.
 - St. Paul's, Columbia
 - Work is almost completed

Our help and resources have also been focused upon helping parishes that have moved into a challenging period.

- St. John's, Huntingdon
 - Overcoming the conflict that has grown out of the uncovering of an embezzlement.

Our need is great. Our "Peer to Peer" effort must grow if we are to thrive. We need qualified and motivated lay volunteers to support our Diocesan-wide effort. We need to empower and form lay people to bring them into the process of helping parishes discover ways to prepare for the future. Failure to expand this resource pool diminishes our efforts to bring the gospel throughout the Diocese.

None of this effort would be possible if we don't weave ourselves together as a Diocese. Only our mutual support and care for each other will make our work possible. Our future lies with each other. We are a communion, bound together by "bonds of affection."

Implementation by Strategic Area

Congregational Development

Mission Statement

The Diocese is a dedicated communion that is constantly working to discern the Holy Spirit's call to mission by helping each other strengthen and live out our lives as a Christian Community.

The Congregational Development Commission has been extraordinary, pro-active, and creative implementing the strategic plan and assuming its role in guiding the Diocese to an exciting future. Its statement of purpose reads:

"The Congregational Development Commission assists the Bishop and other Diocesan leadership in the urgent work of our Diocesan mission. This will be achieved by strengthening the ministries of our Parishes by providing oversight, support and discernment for those areas under our charge, including:

- Congregational Projects Grants
- Operating Grants
- Parish Transformation
- Clergy Deployment
- Clergy Wellness
- Stewardship
- Planned Giving
- Mission and Evangelism.

We believe in the power of the Holy Spirit to move our Diocese and parishes in the direction of transformation and greater vitality."

The Congregational Development Commission is identifying parishes in various stages of transformation seeking so they can work with a parish and support its efforts to move into, or continue, in the thrive model. They also are looking at parishes that are thriving and seeking new ways to support them and help them grow.

During the past year the Congregational Development Commission has taken leadership in a variety of ways.

Strengthening Convocations

With the completion of the Diocesan Effectiveness Review (DER) by the Standing Committee, the commission sought to use it as a guide to answer the questions,

- "What kind of Diocese are we?"
- "Are we a family size Diocese masquerading as a program, or a corporate size Diocese?"

Answering these questions and the other questions that will flow from those answers will guide us to a better understanding of how we relate to each other so we can continue our reorganization and better meet the needs of each parish and of the Diocese as a whole. The Congregation Development Commission assumed this important listening and information gathering task. They visited and facilitated at each fall convocation meeting. The commission members did a lot of listening, and the results are powerful. They found that we desire better relationships. We want to resolve issues as Convocation. Convocations as currently organized may not make sense given cultural and geographic boundaries. See the Congregational Development Commission Report for more details. It is exciting. We are moving and getting better connected and stronger.

Developing Peer to Peer Review Process

The research work done by the Rev. Jonathon Currier and Tyrone Powers on our Fair Share issues discovered that many Dioceses are moving to resolving their "Fair Share" issues not through the Diocesan office but rather by working "Peer to Peer." This simply means that a collection of people from a variety of parishes may help a struggling parish to identify and resolve its needs. During the past year people have been trained as mediators, others have stepped forward to offer their skills in Appreciative Inquiry, Finance, Parish Companions and Accounting. The next step is to form teams and identify parishes where these resources might enhance and strengthen the parish. Further "Peer to Peer" efforts will link us as a Diocese as relationships are built while working together to solve problems and create opportunities.

Further, the Finance Committee and the Council of Trustees using the research approved a resolution for convention that places the Finance Committee as the arbiter of "Fair Share" through a negotiating process that focuses on investing in the future so we can thrive. This is effectively a "Peer to Peer" process that will bring better understanding and hopefully support to our "Fair Share" process.

New Enterprise Zones

This concept is simply to invest in parishes that have been identified as ones where growth might be obtained by thoughtful investment. The New Enterprise Zones also allow the Diocese to become a "Learning Diocese," as we study each of the zones and learn from their efforts. We expect mistakes. We expect successes. Each New Enterprise Zone provides the Diocese valuable information on how to go about strengthening our presence in Central Pennsylvania.

The four parishes identified:

- Coudersport/Brookland in the Northern Tier The Rev. Janis Yskamp is the rector. The Rev. Ted Babcock has worked with The Rev. Yskamp and the parish. The Potter County Parish's' goal is to move the rector from half-time to full-time. The rector was half-time and is now 3/4 time with the hope that within 3-5 years, she will be full-time. The area shows great promise for growth.
- St. Andrew's, State College, Altoona The Rev. Richard Wall is rector. The Rev. Robyn Szoke and Canon Bill Graffius have worked on this New Enterprise Zone. The goal is to bring the Penn State Chaplaincy within the parish and to bring a priest on board who can help the parish culturally move from a program size to a corporate size parish. The Rev. Fred Miller will be filling that position as a retired half-time priest.
- St. Benedict's, New Freedom No rector; only supply priests. The Rev. Robyn Szoke and Canon Bill Graffius along with David Morath (the Parish Companion) have worked directly with this parish. The goal is to get an energetic priest who is committed to taking this vibrant and very much alive church plant to parish status over the next 5-7 years. The strategy is to share the priest with a nearby parish so a full-time priest can be hired and can provide the energy at both parishes. We hope to have this filled by the first quarter of 2014.
- St. Andrew's in the City No rector; only supply priest. The Rev. Robyn Szoke and The Rev. Ted Babcock have worked on this New Enterprise Zone. The goal here is to make St. Andrew's in the City a mission church of the Diocese and help them strengthen our presence in the city of Harrisburg. This parish is excited and moving forward quickly. We expect to begin to look for their half-time rector by the summer of 2013.

Each zone offers the Diocese a variety of opportunities to learn how to grow our faith in different geographic, cultural, and ethnic areas. The Congregational Development Commission is charged with overseeing and evaluating each of these New Enterprise Zones.

Clear outcomes based evaluation will be used for each New Enterprise Zone. See *Appendix* for the one to be used with Coudersport/Brookland. The outcomes are negotiated with the vestry and will be used to evaluate each zone. The idea is to commit to the zone for three years, and if they achieve their agreed-upon goals, then they will receive another two years of investment. Part of the learning will be are the goals "realistic" or do they need adjustment? When we come up short, we will ask the question "why?" and seek to understand what happened. Conversely, if a goal is wildly exceeded, then the same question will be asked. The Commission will share these findings with the Diocese.

Congregational Development Grant Committee

Has taken a stronger, more directed look at parishes and has also moved to outcomes based evaluation. They have asked that their budget be increased to \$200,000 for 2014 so parishes can leave their starvation diets and begin to invest in their future. See Committee report. Also see Project Grants report.

Seminarian Investments

Bishop Baxter has decided that we as a Diocese need to invest in and retain those who we have raised up for the priesthood. We will try to retain two of our seminarians for 2014. They too will be on an outcomes based program for two years while we invest in them and the parish in which they do their curacy.

Clergy Wellness

The Diocese has been able to secure financing for a two-year pilot clergy wellness program from the Widows Corporation. The Pilot Financing has been exhausted so the Congregational Development Commission requested continued financing for 2013 and 2014, and it was approved by Finance and the Council of Trustees. It awaits Convention approval. This program was headed by The Rev. Canon Ed Messersmith and The Rev. John Emmert. They are looking for new leadership and have prepared a new model that seems to be a bit more organic than the initial model. Those who participated in the three retreats and follow-on session have found the program to be rejuvenating and valuable. It is critical that we invest in the spiritual, physical and emotional health of our clergy, active and retired.

Work Led by The Rev. Canon Robyn Szoke

Congregational Development work done includes supporting and facilitating congregations to discern their next mission steps. During 2012, the following congregations have engaged in the Appreciative Inquiry Process that is used and shared in the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania. In some instances the whole congregation was involved.

Outcomes for each congregation include the following in addition to their own strategic steps:

- 1. Discernment of vision and values and hopes and dreams becomes measurable goals for each congregation.
- 2. Strengthening mission organization by engaging the gifts of the congregation around 3-5 selected areas.
- 3. Clarity of direction leads to leadership training and development.
- 4. Spirit and energy and passion of congregation are observable and engaged.

Next steps for the Congregational Development Commission:

1. Hold an Appreciative Inquiry Training for facilitators in the Diocese to train at least 8 to 10 more facilitators.

- 2. Develop Convocation AI leadership as a resource for congregations and their planning.
- Invite folks for an Appreciative Inquiry process retreat for all the congregations and facilitators

Ministry Formation Task Group

The Pilot Program recommended by this group was tried for the last 12 months, and it was decided, as to be expected in any Pilot, that we were not going in the right direction nor with the urgency required to fill a desperate need in the Diocese for bi-vocation part-time and non-stipendiary priests. So with all the "learnings" from our first effort, we are rapidly moving forward as quickly as possible with a course correction. The follow-on effort is headed by The Rev. Robyn Szoke. Classes will begin March 2013, and Lay Leadership classes will begin in the Fall of 2013. Again this is a pilot. There will be mistakes. We will go in a wrong direction occasionally, but the new Advisory Board has been charged by our Bishop to insure that the Pilot continues to move forward and evolve so we can successfully form new priests, deacons and lay leaders for our Diocese.

Other Congregational Development Commission work includes deployment staffed by Canon Bill Graffius. He focuses on:

- Identifying priests who can fill our rector full- and part-time needs; our priest in charge needs, our interim priest/rector needs, and our supply priest needs.
- Revising Letters of Agreement (LOAs) to reflect the changing economics and social dynamics in the Diocese as well as the Diocesan direction.
- Working to enrich the Mutual Ministry Review process (MMR). Bill Graffius and Robyn Szoke have been sent for one week's training on Appreciative Inquiry, and they plan to bring that process to improve and strengthen the current MMR process.
- Helping to resolve disputes or conflicts in parishes.
- Preparing lay people to be Parish Companions so they can work with parishes in transition. Current parish Companions include David Morath, Ron Markle and Kevin Frv.

The Congregational Development Commission and Deployment are also working to develop a healthier deployment process for both the parish and the priests involved in the process.

Communications

Mission Statement

Using innovative and diverse technologies, the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania will ensure that the Good News of Jesus Christ is communicated to all our people and communities beyond our borders.

The Communications Committee, under the guidance of Canon Linda Arguedas, has made an incredible impact in the Diocese of CPA. Not only have they dramatically reduced costs, they have worked to find new and innovative ways to communicate our "Good News," not only to ourselves but also to the world around us. The Commission has also implemented many new ways of communication to save clergy and lay people valued time and money.

Formation and Mission Commission

The Formation and Mission Commission has been active during the past year helping the Diocese to insure that we form and prepare people of all ages for mission and leadership.

Purpose Statement for the Formation and Mission Commission

The Formation Commission is to assist the Bishop and other Diocesan leadership in the work of strengthening the Christian formation of our communities by providing oversight, support and strategic planning for those areas under our charge including:

- Life-long formation
 - children
 - youth
 - young adults
 - adults
- Liturgy and Music
- Anti-Racism
- Safe Guarding God's children/people

We live out our call to mission in ways that nurture and prepare all ages for life-long formation in Christian leadership. To that end the Commission is:

- Identifying parishes with models of formation that focus on mission/leadership and the desire to thrive.
- Discovering ways to provide Diocesan opportunities for leadership formation that resource parish leadership and mission.
- Evaluating new models of Christian formation in the church and offering them as resource ideas for parish life.

Making our Churches Safe for All

The Commission successfully worked with Diocesan staff to put on an all out effort to get every active priest and deacon in the Diocese trained in Safe Church practices – "Safe Guarding God's Children and People." Only two priests failed to comply by attending the Diocesan training or the supplemental training. But even they achieved compliance before the 12/31/12 date.

This is a success the Diocese can be very proud of. There may have been some grousing about the "mandatory" nature of the training, but by our own canon law and those of the national church make it mandatory and we are finally as a Diocese in full compliance. This is an important step forward for all of us as we seek to be obedient to God's desires for all of us.

As we move toward making our churches as safe as possible, we will offer Anti-Racism and Diversity training the first weekend in October 2013. Then during the first Saturday of October 2014, we will offer a training that helps us to insure our church finances are in compliance with Federal and State laws and how to prevent fraud. We will also offer training on how to review your parish buildings to see if they are safe for all.

Leadership Formation

Mission Statement

We will provide all people and parishes of the Diocese with opportunities to prepare and be formed to live out the Baptismal Covenant in the "Spirit of Mission."

New Vision Statement to be developed during formation and mission retreat.

To begin to define our work, we are looking at the ways to connect an ever-changing culture with the call to be in Christian mission using an "ancient...future" model that focuses on spirituality along with institutional identity. The hope is to discover how the parish educational structures along with worship and reflection opportunities prepare leadership call to live out the Baptismal Covenant. We will first take a look in the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania:

- How Leadership is formed in community
- Marks of effective leadership: Best Practices
- Confusion about leadership roles in the midst of transition
- Who are effective lay leaders and how do they lead?
- And how are they formed?

We will then work to collaborate and design opportunities and communicate findings to the Diocese.

Convocations

As a result of the DER and the Congregational Development Commission work, the implementation of a Convocational Strategy will be important during the next year. There is a clear desire to have authority and budget monies pushed down to the local level so the Convocation can better support its parishes. There is a desire in some cases to change Convocation boundaries. The proposed changes will disrupt existing relationships and systems, but will help to form new bonds. There are real cultural issues to deal with as Convocation lines are re-drawn. To implement this grass roots strategy effectively and affectively, a significant change in Convocation ethos is needed. If the Convocation is to be a focal point of budget money and its distribution to parishes, the Convocations will have to meet more than twice a year. There will have to be real lines of accountability from the parishes to the Convocation and the Convocations to the Council of Trustees.

This is a complex change and it must be done thoughtfully and intentionally with the Diocese as a whole involved in the discussion.

Title IV Issues

During the past year, five Title IV issues were brought to the Diocese's attention. All occurred in the early to mid 2000's. Two have been full investigated and closed. One has been referred out to another Diocese, and two are still under investigation. We should all celebrate the fact that Bishop Nathan Baxter has a "Zero Tolerance" policy and every accusation will be investigated and properly brought to closure. These issues take a lot of time and effort and are a huge emotional drag for all involved.

Financial Misconduct

During the past year, the Rev. Patrick Collins was accused of misusing his discretionary fund. It was reviewed immediately by The Rev. Canon David Zwifka, who found no evidence of any misuse of the discretionary fund. Rumors of a missing \$500 continued, so The Rev. Patrick Collins and the new treasurer were asked to assemble the church financial records. They were reviewed by the Canon to the Ordinary who detected a clear pattern of fraud. At that point Church Insurance was notified and a claim filed. York Investigating, working for Church Insurance, did a forensic audit and determined that about \$19,000 had been taken. All but \$850 was paid in the claim to the church. The alleged perpetrator, the former senior warden and treasurer, has been arrested and arraigned.

Diocesan Real Estate

Diocesan House:

The Diocesan house is for sale. There have been no "real" offers in this very poor market.

Lykens:

There have been no offers on this property. We are looking to sell/give away the organ, pews and other furniture and then take the buildings down and give the town the lot to get the expense off the books.

Conclusion

We have been led throughout this year by a deep faith that God is calling us out of our old ways of being church into a new life; a life that is filled with a journey that will bring all of us closer to God. It is a journey that begins with a belief that God is calling us into new life; that we are not called to remain where we are or as we are. It is a journey that is characterized by carefully listening to the spirit. It is a journey of radical transformation. It is a journey guided by and filled with God's love.

God's grace that flows through Jesus Christ reinforces us so we can step "boldly into the world." As we seek new relationships with each other our relationship with Jesus as Lord and Savior strengthens and grows. As we seek to deepen our knowledge of Jesus we will be guided into the future. Our confidence is strengthened as we hear Jesus' call individually and collectively. Because God loved us first our response must be to follow Jesus and his disciples going into the world proclaiming God's radical salvation to all.

Appendix

Process for preparing and investing in an enterprise area

- 1. The Diocese having identified the Potter County Episcopal Congregations, as parishes with real opportunities to provide the Diocese models of new growth through evangelism and mission, the Diocese and the Vestries of the Parishes of All Saints Brookland and Christ Church, Coudersport, and the Rector make the following agreement.
- 2. The Diocese will support the Parishes through financial assistance allowing for the promotion of Rector to a 3/4 position. The Parishes will pursue areas of growth in mission and ministry detailed below.
- 3. Together the Parishes, Rector and the Diocese have discerned their needs and outcomes these areas of growth as follows:
 - a. One-year goals
 - b. Two-year goals
 - c. Three-year goals
 - d. Appraisal of overall effort at year three to decide how to go forward or terminate the enterprise.
 - e. Years four and five to be determined based on appraisal by Council of Trustees, Finance Committee and Commission for Congregational Development.
- 4. The Rector and Diocese will support parish leadership as they shape the strategy, plan and outcomes to meet their identified needs for each of the years and their goals.
 - a. Help Parishes determine the importance of each goal.
 - b. Encourage Parishes to come up with additional actionable and measurable goals.
- 5. The Rector and the Diocese with the Parish leadership will monitor the progress as the investment is made and make mid-course adjustments. In addition, there will be an annual review of the progress of enterprise area. The review will be done by the Finance Committee and the Council of Trustees with the Congregational Development Commission advising. Ongoing reviews (at least quarterly) are the responsibility of the Congregational Development Commission who will provide a written report to the Finance Committee and the Council of Trustees.

Key Outcomes

- 1. Increase of individual involvement in the mission and ministry of the Parishes.
- 2. Obtain clear focus of the mission and ministry of each Parish.
- 3. Expand fundraising to support increased revenue needed
- 4. Increase of outreach to community
- 5. Increase of parish and community use of Parish facilities

Process for Preparing and Investing in an Enterprise Area

There will be an annual review of the progress of the Potter County Churches enterprise area. The review will be done by the Finance Committee and the Council of Trustees with the Congregational Development Commission advising. Ongoing reviews (at least quarterly) are the responsibility of the Congregational Development Commission who will provide a written report to the Finance Committee and the Council of Trustees.

This grant will also be a three-year declining balance grant from the Diocese.

2012 Report of the Standing Committee

Article IV of the Constitution and Canons of The Episcopal Church require that "in every Diocese a Standing Committee shall be elected by the Convention." The responsibilities of the Standing Committee are very broad and involve every aspect of the church. The Standing Committee functions as the "Bishop's Council of Advice," and in the absence of a Bishop is the ecclesiastical authority in the Diocese. A Bishop's election cannot be confirmed without the consent of the majority of the Standing Committees in the Episcopal Church, nor can a Deacon or Priest be ordained without the consent of the Standing Committee. In matters of property, the consent of the Standing Committee is required before any church property can be bought or sold.

At its first meeting after the Diocesan Convention of 2012, the Standing Committee voted to appoint a vice-president. This was to assist in the transition to Lay presidency as approved by Convention.

During the course of the year, on behalf of the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania, the Standing Committee has approved for candidacy and ordination to Holy Orders Elaine Thomas, Diane Scheide, Becky Zartman, Betsy Marker, Regina Barrett, and Henry McQueen.

On behalf of the parishes in the Diocese, the Standing Committee, in conjunction with the Canon to the Ordinary and the Finance Committee, has approved financial loans for development of Church property for All Saints, Hershey, St. James, Mansfield, and St. James, Lancaster.

In the wider Church, the Standing Committee has consented to the election of William Jay Lambert, Bishop of the Diocese of Eau Claire, and Anne Hodges-Copple as Bishop Suffragan of the Diocese of North Carolina. The Standing Committee also granted consent to the election of a Bishop Suffragan for the Diocese of New York.

The President and Vice-President of the Standing Committee acted as a Council of Advice to the Bishop in his considerations of a Bishop-in-Residence for the Diocese during his Sabbatical.

Finally, the Standing Committee, in concert with the Bishop, released to the Diocese the Diocesan Effectiveness Review. This process, as set out in the Bishop's Letter of Agreement, was begun when the Rev. Linda Watkins was President of the Standing Committee and continued during the tenure of the Rev. Daphne Messersmith. It is appropriate that the President acknowledge the leadership of these past presidents as well as that of Martha Harris, member of the Standing Committee, who chaired the DER task force.

Annual Report Commission on Ministry The Diocese of Central Pennsylvania

The Commission on Ministry is responsible by canon for acting as a council of advice to the Bishop on matters relating to ordination, as well as the support of formation for both lay and ordained ministry. The process for discernment of vocation, formation and preparation for ordination, and final recommendation of candidates for ordination is laid out in great detail in the diocesan Total Ministry Handbook. This handbook is available on the diocesan Web site, "Ministry Guide for Clergy": http://s3.amazonaws.com/dfc_attachments/public/documents/3161051/ministryguide.pdf The Commission is currently in the process of reviewing the handbook.

After a decade of outstanding leadership, the Rev. Canon David Lovelace, Vice President of the Commission (the Bishop is President, by canon), 'retired' from this ministry. His shoes were so 'big' that the bishop decided to appoint two priests, the Rev. Canons Paul Donecker and Mark Scheneman to lead the Commission as Vice Presidents, and share the related responsibilities. Canon Donecker oversees the BACOM Conference (Bishop's Advisory Committee on Ministry) which now anticipates conducting two annual events for those discerning a call to ordained ministry. He will also be working with clergy ordained in other denominations who seek ordination in the Episcopal Church. Canon Scheneman chairs the COM meetings and working with the Bishop's Executive Secretary, Carolyn Patterson, overseeing the canonical process for ordination.

The Commission also has been asked to help support the development of the new diocesan School of Christian Studies programs for formation of local clergy and certified lay ministries.

2012 Report of the Committee for Children's Ministry

In 2012, the Committee's significant events were as follows:

BASIC (Brothers and Sisters in Christ)

This is our annual week-long camp ministry for children, and it takes place during the first week of August. Children who have completed 3rd grade through having completed 8th grade are encouraged to participate in this event. This program is held at Camp Mount Luther and is a shared ministry that lives into "Called to Common Mission." The goals of the program are to provide our children with opportunities to explore and grow their faith in a setting that is different from their home congregations. BASIC - We celebrate our partnership between Camp Mount Luther, the Upper Susquehanna Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, and the Episcopal Diocese of Central Pennsylvania.

Godly Play Enrichment Training Session was held on the evening of June 15 and all day Saturday, June 16, 2012 at St. Andrew's, Shippensburg, PA. Nine Godly Play storytellers from four congregations attended for enrichment training.

Commuter Core Training by Godly Play Foundation - Module 1 was held on December 1, 2012 at St. Andrew's, State College. The Diocese provided Scholarships for 1/3 of the participants' tuition. Twelve participants from four congregations attended.

The Life-Long Formation event scheduled for December 8 at St. James, Lancaster, to host keynote speakers Roger Nishoika and Deidre Good, included an all-day program for children. Unfortunately the event was postponed due to low registration, but the Children's Committee worked together planning for the event. The planning time was a significant achievement in cooperation.

2012 Report of the Youth Committee

The Youth of the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania did some outstanding formation work in the year 2012. At the same time, we also experienced some challenges and setbacks that revealed the need for continual growth, discernment and communications within our program and ministries.

Happening. This is a youth-designed and youth-led spiritual retreat, renewal and revival weekend. The adult leaders serve as mentors to a core leadership group. This group of youth elects their 'rector' who then calls her/his staff to other roles and positions of leadership. These youth choose a theme, complete with a central biblical verse, and then design a weekend around that theme. The youth prepare a series of 12 talks that they give to other youth in the Diocese at the Happening Retreat. This year Happening was moved to Camp Mount Luther. While Happening took place in the early part of the year, youth had been preparing for the event since the fall of 2011 with a series of retreat weekends.

Middle School Lenten Retreat. This event is led by adults, but older high school students (juniors and seniors who are active in the youth program) are invited to 'return' and be on staff. This provides a time for leadership development and training for the older youth and a time of introduction for the middle school students. The retreat, which takes place at Camp Mount Luther, began with the singing of the Exsultet and a procession. During the rest of the weekend, youth saw a movie, made rosaries and explored their faith through a small service project to the camp.

The passing of a resolution designed to allow a youth presence at Diocesan convention was a very successful moment for our youth and the program. The desire for this came when youth who attended EYE 2011 spoke with their new friends and learned that other Dioceses have an official youth presence at their conventions. The youth wanted to bring this back to our Diocese so that their voices and concerns could be heard by the larger church.

X-Teen. This event took place at Camp Mount Luther beginning on Father's Day. Youth who attended Episcopal Youth Event in 2011 had requested that a service component be added to the program in 2012. In order to make this dream a reality, the youth leaders began discussions with parishes in GLEAM and the Williamsport area. The youth attended a 'traditional' camp setting, complete with one night of 'sleeping under the stars' from Sunday until Friday afternoon. On Friday, the youth were able to spend time with Bishop Baxter and Bishop Dreisen from the Upper Susquehanna Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, prior to departing for Williamsport. While in Williamsport they worked in several church buildings, in houses and in various projects around the area. We were blessed with the gracious hospitality of All Saints', Williamsport and Christ Church, Williamsport, who allowed our youth and their leaders to stay in and work on their parish properties during this event. We also want to extend our sincere thanks to Church of the Good Shepherd, Montoursville, and Church of our Savior, Montoursville, for opening their hearts and churches to our youth. The youth of the program were so moved and inspired by their service work that they have requested to continue this service component and have even requested that the service trip in 2013 be to a region impacted by Hurricane Sandy.

Brothers and Sisters In Christ (BASIC). This week-long camping program took place at Camp Mount Luther during the end of July and the beginning of August. It is a crossover event because middle school students are encouraged to participate as campers, and because older high school students (juniors and seniors who are active in the youth program) are invited to serve on staff as interns for the week. This year we looked at some of the themes of God and faith in Dr. Seuss stories.

Internship program at Camp Mount Luther. While we encourage our youth to attend BASIC as intern staff, any youth who attends a previous week of camp is allowed to apply for a second week as an intern. Our youth are beginning to take advantage of some of the benefits of our partnership with the Lutherans.

The summer of 2012 also saw four young adults serve on the paid summer staff at Camp Mount Luther. This was the second summer in a row for these individuals, and they have opened the door for other

youth to pursue continuing leadership development and faith development. It is our hope that youth who graduated in 2012 will consider applying for staff positions at Camp Mount Luther in 2013 and beyond.

Once the summer was complete, the youth who had been elected to lead Happening #6 began to meet. This occurred in a series of 3 weekend-long retreats throughout the Diocese. We want to thank St. Andrew's, Lewisburg, Christ Church, Williamsport, and St. John's, Lancaster, for your hospitality in warmly welcoming and hosting us during those different weekends.

We met our first difficult moment during the fall. At the request of youth, we had scheduled our Fall X-Teen event with the theme of discernment. We were excited by this theme and had arranged for 'guest speakers' to come and present the ideas of vocation and discernment to the youth. What we didn't plan on was an impact of national, state and local politics on our program. Many school districts across our Diocese have now begun charging youth and their families for the privilege of participating in extracurricular activities such as athletics and music. Because of this, the school districts have lengthened the season or time of these activities. November had previously been a 'safe' time to plan for youth events, but that changed this year. We discovered that while our youth are very interested in the topic of discernment, they were not able to participate because of school-based activities. We are re-evaluating the situation and have adjusted our schedule of activities for 2013.

CHALLENGES

Because of the cancellation of Fall X-Teen, we quickly put together an alternative event. We want to thank St. Andrew's, State College, for being such warm and gracious hosts on such short notice. During this gathering we explored Advent and quietly waiting for the Lord.

The second challenge for us came again in the fall. We had planned on a large gathering to welcome Dr. Rodger Nishioka, a well-known and respected authority in the area of youth ministry and studies. Youth of our Diocese were introduced to Dr. Nishioka at EYE 2011 when he was a keynote speaker. His honesty and sincerity touched our youth and they wanted to bring him and his passion to our Diocese. The event was scheduled for early December, but was postponed due to a lack of registrations. As a committee, we have learned two important lessons:

- We need to continue to reach out to our young people and their families we advertised the
 event in the Diocesan Digest and on the website, but we failed to get our message out to
 many families who did not know about Dr. Nishioka or about the event itself.
- 2. While it seemed like a good idea initially, scheduling events during Advent is problematic. With the schools increasing the length of time for their activities, what once was a quiet time is now busier than ever.

Moving into 2013 sees our program continuing to grow in exciting ways. We are encouraged to see our youth grow in their faith and grow to become leaders in our church.

YOUNG ADULT MINISTRY

The young adults of the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania commit ourselves to create a safe place for community, self-discovery, and finding identity for people in the Diocese between the ages of 18 and 32. We commit ourselves to create a place where young adults can find their spirituality as they grow into a new part of their lives and to address the need for mission and social justice in our Diocese and the world through young adult mission.

Activities (Objectives) and Short-term Outcomes/Goals

Year 1:

Activity: Identify the young adults in the Diocese by contacting all of the parishes and colleges and universities in the Diocese. Contact by both electronic means and visitation.

Outcome: We have been in contact with a variety of parishes and academic institutions and have gained the interest of potentially 5 more Young Adults. This initiative (Activity) will always need to be ongoing.

Activity: To have members trained to run a Vocare event.

Outcome: Two members are willing and able to attend Vocare training this spring (2013) and one more member is able to attend at the beginning of summer (2013).

Activity: To explore ways in which we can do mission and ministry.

Outcome: This activity continues to be ongoing. We are attempting to discover ways in which we can reach the young adult community and, in particular, what ministry we hunger for – both what needs to be ministered to us and how we can play a role in that ministry

Year 2

Activity: To gather the young adults identified in year one together.

Outcome: We had our first meeting in September 2012 and our second meeting in January of 2013. Our first meeting only had three attendees, plus two clergy, but we anticipate some more attendees at the January meeting. The lack of attendance does not necessarily indicate a lack of enthusiasm or interest; it merely involves schedule conflicts, usually regarding previously scheduled events or individuals away at university.

Activity: To plan and organize a Vocare event, potentially during fall of 2013; possibly around the time of the Presiding Bishop's schedule visit, in the fall of 2013.

Outcome: We currently have no outcomes for this activity.

Activity: To explore the five marks of mission in all that we do, working them into our events yearly.

Outcome: We, young adults of the Diocese of Central PA, by virtue of our baptismal covenant and conscious awareness, are attempting, with each meeting, to discover ways in which we can make the 5 Marks of Mission manifest, and, by virtue of that discernment, are inherently beginning to live into them through the process. This will always be an ongoing activity.

Results of Past/Ongoing Work

Past/Ongoing Activities: Our Past/Ongoing activities include: continuing expansion of the Young Adult Ministry, by discerning what ministries and missions are needed to meet the needs, and encourage involvement on a parochial, Diocesan, and national level, of the young adults within our Diocese.

Outcomes/Results: We have seen encouraging results, as, over the past four months, three additional young adults have expressed interest in this ministry; some at a leadership level and some at an involvement level.

2012 Report of the Commission on Congregational Development

Reformed by Bishop Baxter in 2011, the Congregation Development Commission began in 2012 to live into our purpose statement, "To assist the Bishop and the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania in the urgent work of mission."

The Commission provides direction and support for four specific diocesan ministries: Project Grants, Mary Amato, chair; Operating Grants, The Revs. Stephen Casey and Andy France, chairs; Clergy Wellness, The Revs. John Emmert and Ed Messersmith, chairs; and Church Deployment, William Graffius, chair. Their summary reports are as follows.

Project Grants

The Project Grants Groups meeting three times each year to award Project Grants. These grants are targeted for new initiatives in congregational development or enrichment. Funds for such matters as expansion of facilities, modifications to comply with statutory mandates, etc., are available from other sources.

This year, we awarded grants to a dozen congregations totaling \$17,775.00.

As we are challenged more and more to respond to the needs of the communities in which our churches have a presence and seek to witness Christ's love for all, there is a continuing need for financial resources to develop creative programs. Project Grants are another way of living out our Diocesan and commission statements. We encourage you to apply for a Project Grant.

Operating Grants

Grants are available for time-limited, specific mission and ministry expenses of congregations within the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania. Of particular interest are mission and ministries that engage new partners in cooperative efforts, leverage new resources that can be used to increase a congregation's capacity, and undertake activities that hold promise to make a lasting, significant impact.

The grant application process is overseen by The Ven. Cn. Andy France and The Rev. Cn. Stephen Casey with Task Force Members Mr. David Poch, Ms. Christy Lassiter, Mr. Bruce Johnson and The Rev. John Hoover.

The amount of the Operating Grants approved and to be given in 2013 totals \$126,300.00 shared among sixteen congregation of the Diocese.

Clergy Wellness

The Wellness Initiative was designed to be a two year pilot ministry. Having started the Wellness Initiative in the late fall of 2011, the pilot program will conclude by the end of 2013.

One focus of the Wellness Initiative has been directed toward the retired clergy of the Diocese. This model was designed on a "chaplaincy" model. Two clergy, the Reverend Dee Calhoun and the Reverend John McDowell, were asked be in touch with retired clergy, either by phone, in person, or by email in order to assess their needs and well-being. Each "chaplain" was assigned a region (north or south) of the diocese.

The other focus of the Wellness Initiative was directed toward active clergy of the Diocese. This model was <u>not</u> designed as a "chaplaincy". The design for Wellness Initiative toward active clergy was based on monthly, small-group retreats.

Clergy were invited to participate in a series of day-long retreats that encouraged and promoted continued spiritual formation, biblical and theological reflection, case studies, the examination of family systems theory, and the principles of Anam Cara, that is, "we cannot serve in ministry alone and expect to survive". Our belief was and still is that only by nurturing strong professional, interpersonal, spiritual friendships with other clergy will we be able to maintain a sense of wellness and faithfulness in our ministries.

The Wellness Initiative to active clergy was not a mandated program. As the program began, all clergy were invited by the Bishop to participate and those interested signed on.

As this pilot comes to a close, we are in the process of formulating a new model for promoting wellness among the clergy of the diocese. The Congregational Development Committee will provide direction with regard to the way this new model is developed and implemented.

We thank the Reverend Canon Ed Messersmith and the Reverend Dr. John Emmert for facilitating the Wellness Pilot directed toward active clergy. Canon Messersmith will be concluding his participation in this ministry as of October, 2013. Dr. Emmert may be continuing his involvement.

We also thank the Reverend Dee Calhoun and the Reverend John McDowell for serving as chaplains to our retired clergy. Their fine and supportive ministry will continue.

And finally, we thank our Bishop, the Right Reverend Dr. Nathan Baxter, the Reverend Canon Ted Babcock, and the Widows and Orphans Corporation for their vision, encouraging support, and spiritual guidance.

Clergy Deployment

The Office of Congregational Development has experienced a very busy year as several Parishes have started the "search" to call a new Priest and several others as they moved from full-time clergy to a clergy of a part-time status. The Parish Companion program is in process of revisions to incorporate necessary and new processes to accommodate the shifting paradigm resulting in staffing less than full-time Parishes and a Mission. Parish Companion volunteers have met to help lead this transition by designing a newly revised Parish Companion informational and training program, and to help identify those interested in becoming a Parish Companion. A new initiative in seeking the assistance of Parish leadership in problem mitigation of and for neighboring Parishes has likewise been tested with, so far, favorable results. Diocesan staff meet, at minimum weekly, internally, and monthly as part of the Diocesan Congregational Commission.

In addition to monthly meetings at Church of the Nativity, Newport, and two-day long planning retreats, the Commission facilitated dialogue gatherings at the seven fall Convocation Meetings. In the coming year we will be working in close conjunction with the Commission on Formation and Mission.

2012 Report of the Communications Committee

Communications throughout the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania continued to make significant strides this year. We continue to work with the team which includes Ms. Lesley Carter, the Diocesan webmaster (part time,) and Linda Arguedas as the staff liaison. Added to the committee this year was Ms. Alexis Dabich, St. Stephen's Cathedral, and Mr. John Xanthpolus, St. Mark's, Lewistown. Technical assistance is supplied by Mr. John Hoy, Diocesan consultant.

The committee continues to move the Diocese forward to better communicate the good news by:

- Improving communications within the leadership of the Diocese and individual parishes.
- Providing communications support and technical assistance for parishes.
- Improving the connection between individual church members and the Diocese.
- Increasing the visibility of the Diocese and the Episcopal Church in Central Pennsylvania.

Throughout this year, we've worked to streamline our communications processes and improve their effectiveness. Here are some of the highlights of that effort:

- Diocesan Digest and Bishop's Message
 - The Digest and Bishop's Message continue to be delivered electronically through an online distribution service -- Vertical Response. One ongoing issue is the collection of all Diocesan parishioners' email addresses.
- Views from the Pews and News from the Pews
 - This video series and the quarterly newsletter help highlight the good works taking place throughout the Diocese in a friendly, easy-to-access format. These tools are designed not only to give visibility to effective efforts from parishes, but to provide inspiration for others throughout the Diocese and to spread best practices.
- Improvements in Diocesan Website
 - The website of the Diocese is undergoing a new look. Thanks to the hard work of our webmaster, the new site will go live at Convention 2013.
- School of Christian Studies
 - Diocesan webmaster, Lesley A. Carter, developed online discussion areas for use by the School of Christian Studies and other groups.

A diocesan-wide Lenten study utilized this discussion area, with seven students participating from around the diocese.

- Diocesan Website
 - Diocesan webmaster, Lesley Carter, began work in early 2013 on the new website design and setup for the diocese. In addition to implementing a new look and feel, various components of the diocesan website experience (e.g., the aforementioned discussion forums, capacity for greater integration with other systems used by the

diocese) will be rolled into the same site as opposed to living on multiple sites. Completion of the site is anticipated by late May 2013

Seasonal Podcasts

 Seasonal podcasts continue and this year we added a Lenten blog, hosted by webmaster, Lesley Carter.

Skype and Adobe Connect

The use of Skype continues with individuals on a one-on-one basis. With the introduction of Adobe Connect last year, we find this platform much more useful and user friendly for larger go-to-meetings.

Introduction of Adobe Connect for Online Meetings

 Where a more robust platform including features like file sharing and collaborative editing is needed, we now have a system allowing participants to see and hear each other and to share presentation information. We expect this system to allow for more effective and frequent committee meetings while significantly reducing travel costs.

Streaming of Services

 Live streaming of the Annual Convention continues, bringing the business of convention to all members of the Diocese. St. Mark's Episcopal Church, Lewistown, continues to livestream their Christmas Eve and Easter services, bringing the love of Christ to those who are unable to attend in person and reaching out to those who do not yet know us.

ACS Communication Seminar and Workshop

- In July, John Hoy and I attended a four-day training in West Virginia given by ACS Technologies Group. This course is designed to give the attendee basic knowledge about the ACS People Module. The training provides hands-on exercises on how to customize user system settings.
- I attended a one-day Communications workshop in Wilkes-Barre on "Communicating Across the Generations." This workshop focused on how to move forward with all the latest in media communications while not leaving behind any people in the pews.

Traditional media presence

 We have had some good placements in the traditional media this year and we are working -- with a very small staff -- to enhance and grow that effort in the coming year.

2012 Committee on Ecumenical Affairs

The Diocesan Ecumenical Affairs Committee is charged with the responsibility of promoting the unity of the Church for which our Savior Jesus Christ prayed. As a Diocese, as well as through various local council of Churches, we work, pray and explore with fellow Christians ways in which that unity may be more fully realized among us. A part of our witness as a Diocese comes through the work of the Pennsylvania Council of Churches, the L.A.R.C. covenant which we share in with our Lutheran and Roman Catholic brothers and sisters in Christ as well as through various ecumenical efforts in college work in several of the college campuses in central Pennsylvania. Earlier in 2013 we had another very successful L.A.R.C. day of dialogue with the theme: *Engaging the Word of God Ecumenically: Inside Vatican II by one who was there and the effects of Dei Verbum on ministry then and now.* For this day we were privileged to have as our speaker Dr. Martin Marty who provided a very entertaining and enlightening personal account of the Council. In addition, we as a Diocese have continued our support of the various ministries sponsored through the Pennsylvania State Council of Churches. We are also active in our participation with the local ecumenical commissions of the Lower Susquehanna Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America and the Roman Catholic Diocese of Harrisburg.

The ever expanding Table of Our Lord provides us all with an ever growing opportunity to demonstrate to the world the nature of our faith in which we all are one in Christ. A noted ecumenist has observed, "The deepening of communion among our churches is not a linear process." The unity that develops "is the work of the Holy Spirit, and in the Holy Spirit's own time."

In our increasingly pluralistic society, we also find ourselves encountering people practicing other religions. And as a result of the last General Convention all parishes will be asked to participate in a survey examining our engagement with other major religions. When this survey becomes available, we encourage everyone to take the time and fill it in so that we might have a more complete picture of how aware we are of this diversity and how it is that we engage with others in our increasingly diverse world.

As always, your Diocesan Committee on Ecumenical Affairs attempts to help us all discern the workings of the Holy Spirit among us all.

Diocese of Central Pennsylvania, Province III Annual Report Spring 2013

It has been a busy year for the Episcopal Women of the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania! Every woman in the Diocese is a member of the ECW regardless of whether or not the parish has an 'official' ECW Chapter, and every woman continues to be welcomed and encouraged to participate in any and all activities, boards, and committees. Here is a tally of events and missions during the past year:

The 47th Triennial Meeting of the Episcopal Church Women in conjunction with General Convention was held in Indianapolis, Indiana, July 5-11. Our delegation consisted of Cindy Mohr, Michele Koons, Bonnie Chambers, Shirley Wagner and alternate Wilma Johnson. The Distinguished Woman from our Diocese was Wilma Johnson. Wilma was honored at a special ceremony with the Bishops from around the country. Two important resolutions were approved that put our National ECW Board in complete compliance with IRS rules. As the ECW falls under the umbrella of the National Episcopal Church, all future board members must be approved by the Presiding Bishop and Executive Council. The UTO now has a National Board under the same guidelines.

As the Triennial's Unified Gift, the national ECW Board elected to partner with Episcopal Relief and Development's Nets for Life. The Central PA Board gave a donation of \$120.00 to purchase 10 nets. The Triennial Community Connection Program was the Bishop John P. Craine House in Indianapolis. This facility houses non-violent women felons with children as an alternative sentencing setting. We purchased a child's car seat as our gift and participated in a 3K run/walk to raise funds for the facility. A check for \$100.00 was presented at the UTO Ingathering Eucharist.

<u>The Church Periodical Club</u> met in Indianapolis just prior to Triennial. Cindy Mohr attended the meeting as the representative from our Diocese. The National Book Fund granted over \$20,000 for U.S. and foreign seminarians, prison ministries and others. Thank you to all who contributed donations or sponsored aid in granting funds for the National Book Fund, Miles of Pennies, and the Operational Fund.

The 107th ECW Annual Meeting was held at St. Andrew's Episcopal Church in York, on November 10, 2012, featuring an *Honored Women Luncheon*. Every parish in the Dioceses of Central Pennsylvania was invited to recognize a woman in their parish who has made a significant contribution to their Parish and/or community. We received 11 nominations. These are women from all walks of life who have been steadfast in their faith and have been willing to share that faith in a myriad of ways. You will find all of these women selflessly serve Jesus Christ by being a part of multiple ministries in their parishes and communities, and their service is an inspiration to us all. During the business meeting, ECW members voted to give a \$1,000 donation to ERD for the "Sandy Relief Fund". An additional \$425.00 was added from a special offering taken during Eucharist.

<u>Book of Remembrance</u> - A Memorial Service was held during the Eucharist at the Annual Meeting. The Book of Remembrance, as a project, was conceived in 1940 by Mrs. Robert T. McCutcheon.

- + The Book of Remembrance is a magnificent memorial book in which are listed the names of the faithful departed women by parishes and mission.
- + Any devoted churchwoman of the Diocese who has been connected with some phase of the church's work can be so honored.
- + The Book is kept at St. Stephens Cathedral and names are read at the Annual ECW Gathering. All parishes are encouraged to submit names to honor their women.

<u>The United Thank Offering</u> – is an important missionary arm of the ECW - a program by which a connection is made between giving thanks and giving money, united praying and sharing of God's blessings in our lives. Every penny collected goes to mission work through the process of grants. Our Diocese did not submit a grant application for 2013.

<u>Lenten Retreat</u> – The 31st Lenten retreat was held at Camp Hebron in Halifax March 21-23, 2012. Fourteen participants attended "A Banner of Faith" presented by The Rev. Rowenna Gibbon and The Rev. Charlene Leigh-Koser. Participants enjoyed a time of quiet meditation, learning, fellowship, and shared thoughts about a variety of readings, including "In the Sanctuary of Women" by Jan L. Richardson.

A continuing challenge for the Lenten Retreat has been declining attendance due mostly to the midweek timing. Efforts to schedule the retreat on a weekend at Camp Hebron were unsuccessful. In 2013, a Day of Prayer replaced the retreat at Camp Hebron.

<u>Cape May Retreat</u> – In September 2012 the Episcopal Church Women's Cape May Retreat was entitled "Having a Mary Heart in a Martha World". The program was presented by Rev. Canon Robyn Szoke. Robyn encouraged all women to come and celebrate our ministry as laywomen in the Body of Christ. Through stories, meditations, activities and sharing each woman explored Mary and Martha in depth realizing how we are both women at different times of our lives and even at different times of the day. Martha and Mary exist in harmony and have important roles in our lives. The highlight of the weekend, as always, is the Saturday Morning Eucharist on the beach. Sunday morning we attend the Episcopal Church of the Advent.

<u>A Mission Objective</u> – All groups of ECW throughout the Diocese were encouraged to support the St. Barnabas Project in Harrisburg, to expand their program for at risk children after school and during the summer while their parents are at work. This program has gone through a re-organization and the Lutheran and Episcopal churches are no longer involved with the program. The Board is exploring other possibilities for a mission project.

<u>Lenten Day of Prayer</u> – All women of the Diocese were invited to participate in a day of quiet meditation, learning, reflecting and fellowship at St. Andrew's, Lewisburg March 9, 2013. This was the first of what we hope will be an annual event. The program "Lessons from Women of the Bible" was presented by The Rev. Susan Claytor, Rector of All Saints Church, Hershey. The day was sponsored by the Episcopal Church Women and Daughters of the King, Diocese of Central PA.

There are so many women within the Diocese who are full of wisdom, faith, compassion and mission. We pray God will bless the work of our ECW in mission and ministry. "Help us to pray fervently, labor diligently and give liberally to make known the power of your love given through your son Jesus. Let us not forget the lessons from the past nor fear the challenges of the future."

2012 Commission on Liturgy and Music

In consultation with the Bishop, the Commission on Liturgy and Music supports the congregations, clergy, and musicians of the diocese by offering programs for continuing education, by providing access to the wide variety of liturgical and musical resources available, and by supporting standards of liturgical excellence for diocesan events and diocesan licensed ministries

Thus, the Commission is responsible for providing opportunities, education, and consultation in the areas of liturgy and church music for the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania. Attendance at a National or Regional conference provides opportunities for growth.

Among its activities, the Commission is involved with Diocesan Liturgies, provides training for Lay Eucharistic Visitors, teaches the courses in Liturgics for the School of Christian Studies, presents programs for growth and involvement in liturgy and music.

Activities in 2012

- Eucharistic Visitor Trainings: The Commission provides the mandated diocesan training sessions for those will serve as Eucharistic Visitors. There are several trainers who conduct the training around the diocesan under the supervision of the Archdeacon for Deacons.
- Diocesan Liturgies: The Commission works with the bishop on liturgical design and coordination, producing bulletins, coordinating music, and providing oversight. Liturgies this year included:
 - Renewal of Vows
 - Diocesan Convention
 - Ordination Services
 - Clergy Conference Worship

Activities planned and projected:

- Regional workshops for licensed lay ministry.
- Workshop for musicians
- Continued training for Eucharistic Visitors
- Continued involvement with Diocesan Liturgies
- Continued design of Liturgics offering in the School of Christian Studies for continued quality improvement.

2012 Report on the School of Christian Studies

Pilot Program for Non-Stipendiary, Bi-Vocational Priests and Lay Assistants

The congregational need for more locally trained, Bi-Vocational Priests and Lay Assistants in the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania is increasing. An initial task force was directed to study and develop a strategic vision for the diocese in terms of formational leadership. Therefore the Diocese of CPA is in the process of developing two pilot programs that will operate as a part of the School of Christian Studies; one program will address the need for the formation of Non-Stipendiary, Bi-Vocational Priests and the other for Lay Assistants. Each program emphasizes the need for life long formation and education. Twenty-eight students were contacted, gathered and invited with the excellent result of five students enrolled in the non-stipendiary priest track for the spring semester 2013.

The result of the work during 2012 is that we have also recruited outstanding faculty this spring semester—The Rev. Dr. Duncan Johnston, teaching, *Anglican Approaches to the Study of Scripture*; and The Rev. Canon David Zwifka, teaching, *One Leg of the Stool: The Sacred Scriptures: The Old Testament in a Pastoral Context.*

The development of the pilot programs as a part of the School of Christian Studies during 2012 has brought us to a different place than we had at first envisioned. Presently the programs are being resourced and guided by the Bishop's Advisory Board, along with Bishop Nathan Baxter. Members include: Chair, The Rev. Canon David Lovelace, The Rev. Canon Dr. Mark Scheneman and The Rev. Canon Paul Donecker, co- chairs of the Commission on Ministry; Ms. Janis Leftridge, representative of the Council of Trustees; Dr. Sam Ward, representative of the Standing Committee; The Rev. Jonathan Currier, Congregational Development Commission, and The Rev. Fred Miller, Formation Commission and The Rev. Cliff Johnston, Chapel of the Good Shepherd, Hawk Run. Diocesan staff include: The Rev. Canon Dr. Ted Babcock, and The Rev. Canon Robyn Szoke-Coolidge. The next 18 months will be a "Beta" testing period for the programs as we continue to seek excellence in formation, discernment process, and educational standards.

The Diaconate Formation Program in the School of Christian Studies continues to strive for excellence in formation, in the programs offered, and in living into "Engaging the Diaconal of All Believers." Our program is oriented to Life-long Learning, Leadership Development, Theological Reflection, Spiritual Practice and Ongoing Discernment. During a time of transition in the School of Christian Studies, the Diaconate Formation Program has continued to thrive and succeed in offering the quality of its program.

Several essential aspects are taken into account, particularly:

- The required canons of The Episcopal Church
- The requirements of the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania
- Principles Common to Quality Diaconal Formation Programs

The following were accomplished in 2012:

- Academic Course: Scripture
- Academic Course: History
- Discernment Course: Participation of those discerning a call to the diaconate in "Exploring Your Ministry", the diocesan course in discernment for all seeking Holy Orders and a deeper understanding how who and what God is calling them to be and to do.

- Attendance by the Director of the Diaconate Formation Program with the Archdeacon for Deacons at the annual Formation Conference of the Association of Episcopal Deacons
- A Workshop for clergy and those in discernment entitled, "Working with the Deacon in the Parish"

2012 Report of OPERATION UNDERSTANDING

The Operation Understanding Committee provides funding for church-based outreach ministries within the borders of our diocese. Operation Understanding gives seed money for start-up ministries as well as funding to sustain successful existing programs. Priority is still given to new ministries. In 2012, Operation Understanding awarded grants to 8 churches for outreach programs in their communities. Several of these churches received grants for more than one ministry.

In 2012, the OU Committee met 3 times. In those meetings, it reviewed and evaluated grant applications, awarded funding, reviewed progress reports, and discussed the award that will be presented at the Diocesan Convention. This award will be given to the church with the most creative new ministry that reaches a vast number of disenfranchised persons.

Operation Understanding's highest priority is providing adequate support to parishes that (1) feed the hungry directly or through food bank programs; (2) offer heating assistance programs; (3) provide programs and education for at-risk children; and (4) offer housing assistance and clothing. We believe that this kind of mission is among the most important ministries to which we as Christians here in Central Pennsylvania are called.

2012 Report of the Peace and Justice Commission

The Peace and Justice Commission is a Diocesan group of clergy and laypeople dedicated to informing the Bishop and our local parishes concerning ALL social justice and Gospel issues. We understand that peace cannot exist without justice, and are committed to helping one another live into the Gospel by fully engaging in creative non-violence. In the past, we have served as a research and "fact-finding" team, supplying Bishop Baxter with "talking points" and information on fracking (Marcellus Shale) and environmental consequences. Most recently, we have been gathering information in order to craft various letters to government officials and op-ed pieces for use in local media on the issue of gun violence.

The Peace and Justice Commission has put forward a Diocesan Resolution for consideration at the forthcoming convention in June and is planning a series of "peacemaking" retreats and workshops for the coming year.

2012 Report of the Archivist

The Diocesan Archives have benefited from many years of careful collection and organization. In my first year of service, I have undertaken to uphold the high standards of our Diocesan Archivist Emerita, Mrs. Jennifer Railing, by focusing on the preservation and care of the archive holdings.

As the archive collection expands, the fascinating story of our spiritual life in Central Pennsylvania continues to grow into a clearer and richer history. In 2012, many additions to the collection have added to that history. Several boxes of personal items belonging to Bishop James Darlington (Diocesan Bishop from 1905 to 1930) are currently being processed. The records of Christ Church, Lykens, and St. Mary's, Williamsport, are undergoing a page-by-page examination for filing and future research purposes. Several boxes of Diocesan administrative records have been received from St. Stephen's Cathedral, Harrisburg, and are being integrated into the archive system. The Diocese continues to receive requests for information on closed parishes in various locations, Nickel Mines for instance, and for baptismal and confirmation data. Service leaflets and newspaper articles continue to be archived as received. A short descriptive guide to the collection and a detailed classification system are being created to aid in archival research.

By paying a visit to the Diocese of Maryland Archivist, Mary Klein, and by attending a two-day Pennsylvania Historical and Museum Commission archive workshop, I have increased my understanding and appreciation for the importance of archival recordkeeping.

My sincere thanks is extended to Bishop Baxter for his continued interest in and encouragement of all archival activities, to my Diocesan staff colleagues for their trustworthy guidance and reliable help, and to my predecessor, Mrs. Jennifer Railing, for her treasured work in our archives.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with the modified cash basis of accounting described in the notes to the financial statement; this includes determining that the modified cash basis of accounting is acceptable basis for the preparation of the financial statements in the circumstances. Management is also responsible for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the organization's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the organization's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

As more fully described in the significant accounting policies and nature of activities footnote to the financial statements, The Episcopal Diocese of Central Pennsylvania and the Incorporated Trustees of the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania has not classified the difference between its assets and liabilities as unrestricted, temporarily restricted, and permanently restricted net assets based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions. In addition, The Episcopal Diocese of Central Pennsylvania has not reported the changes in each of those classes of net assets in the combined statement of revenues, expenses and changes in fund balances - modified cash basis and has not disclosed information about expenses reported by their functional classifications in the combined statement of revenues, expenses and changes in fund balances - modified cash basis or the notes to the financial statements. Presentation of such information is required by the modified cash basis of accounting. The effects on the financial statements of that departure from those accounting principles are not reasonably determinable.

Qualified Opinion

In our opinion, except for the effects of the matter discussed in the preceding paragraph, the combined financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the combined assets, liabilities and fund balances-modified cash basis of The Episcopal Diocese of Central Pennsylvania and the Incorporated Trustees of the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania as of December 31, 2012, and its combined revenues, expenses and changes in fund balances - modified cash basis for the year then ended in accordance with modified cash basis of accounting as described in the notes to the financial statements.

Basis of Accounting

We draw attention to the significant accounting policies and nature of activities footnote to the financial statements, which describe the basis of accounting. The financial statements were prepared on the modified cash basis of accounting, which is a basis of accounting other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Our opinion is not modified with respect to that matter.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS DECEMBER 31, 2012

SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND NATURE OF ACTIVITIES

Nature of activities

The Episcopal Diocese of Central Pennsylvania (Diocese) is a constituent of the Episcopal Church, known as the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America. The Diocese is a nonprofit organization and is dedicated to establishing, developing and promoting all aspects of church ministry within the sixty-six parishes of Central Pennsylvania. The Diocese is supported primarily through fair share pledges from each of the parishes.

Basis of accounting

The accompanying combined financial statements have been prepared on the modified cash basis of accounting. This basis differs from generally accepted accounting principles primarily because revenues and expenses are recorded when received rather than when earned or incurred, with the exception of investments which are carried at fair market value and the related appreciation or depreciation is recognized in the current period and accounted for as a revenue or expense. In addition, investment income and fourth quarter distributions by the Trust are recognized when earned or incurred, respectively. Payroll tax withholdings are reported as a liability based on wages paid in the current year.

Principles of combining

The combined financial statements include the accounts of The Episcopal Diocese of Central Pennsylvania and the Incorporated Trustees of the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania (Incorporated Trustees). The Incorporated Trustees is a related entity which acts as a trustee for the Diocese and its parishes by investing funds on their behalf. These funds are pooled and managed by the trust department of BNY Mellon, which also maintains separate accounts for each depositor. All material interorganization transactions have been eliminated.

Fund balances

In order to ensure the observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of the resources available to the Diocese, the accounts of the Diocese are maintained in accordance with the principles of "fund accounting". That is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds that are in accordance with the activities or objectives specified. Separate accounts are maintained for each fund. Accordingly, all financial transactions have been recorded and reported by fund group. Definition of the funds used by the Diocese are:

Unrestricted fund - amounts currently available for use in the Diocese ministries.

Restricted funds - amounts designated to be used for a specific purpose or donor restricted.

Custodial accounts - Diocese parish funds pooled for investment purposes. These are not assets of the Diocese.

SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND NATURE OF ACTIVITIES (Cont'd.)

Fund balances (Cont'd.)

The Organization has not implemented FASB ASC 958 which requires the Organization to classify the differences between its assets and liabilities and changes in net assets as unrestricted, temporarily restricted, and permanently restricted net assets based on existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions. In addition, the Organization has not disclosed information about expenses reported by their functional classifications in the combined statement of revenues, expenses and changes in fund balances - modified cash basis.

Property and equipment

The cost or value of property and equipment are expensed in the year purchased. In addition, real estate used or located in certain parishes is generally titled in the name of the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania. These properties are maintained and used by the respective parishes.

Investments - Incorporated Trustees

Investments are reported at fair value. Trust accounts maintained by the Incorporated Trustees include investments of the Diocese, the Incorporated Trustees, and custodial funds for any of the sixty-six parishes. The funds are pooled to maximize earnings. Participation and income allocations are based on the market value of the investments held at the quarterly distribution dates. Income for each calendar quarter is allocated on the basis of percentages of participation as of the last day of the quarter. Trust participation terminations are made at market value. The investment balances include investment income earned but not received and includes reductions for fourth quarter distributions paid in the following year.

Income taxes

The Diocese is statutorily exempt from federal income taxes under the Internal Revenue Code.

Subsequent events

The Diocese has evaluated subsequent events through May 9, 2013, the date which the financial statements were available to be issued. It is management's opinion that there were no subsequent events which require additional disclosure in the notes to the financial statements.

FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

Fair value accounting standards provide the framework for measuring fair value. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation methods used to measure fair value. This hierarchy consists of three broad levels: Level 1 inputs consist of unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities and have the highest priority; Level 2 inputs consist of observable inputs other than quoted prices for identical assets; and Level 3 inputs have the lowest priority to unobservable inputs.

The Diocese uses the following valuation techniques to measure fair value of assets on a recurring basis. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2012.

Cash and cash equivalents - The carrying amount approximates fair value because of the short-term nature of these investments.

Equities, fixed income bond and security funds and managed futures - Fair value was based on quoted market prices for the identical securities.

The preceding methods may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although the Diocese believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

Changes in fair value levels

The availability of observable market data is monitored to assess the appropriate classification of financial instruments within the fair value hierarchy. Changes in economic conditions or model-based valuation techniques may require the transfer of financial instruments from one fair value level to another. In such instances, the transfer is reported at the beginning of the reporting period.

We evaluated the significance of transfers (if any) between levels based upon the nature of the financial instrument and size of the transfer relative to total net assets. For the year ended December 31, 2012, there were no significant transfers in or out of levels 1, 2 or 3.

CONTINGENCIES

Certain parishes of the Diocese have entered into loans which have been co-signed by the Bishop of the Diocese. In the event of default, the Diocese may be obligated to pay the unpaid portion of the defaulted obligations. The outstanding balance of such loans at December 31, 2012 was approximately \$ 1,193,928.

The Diocese has an unsecured line-of-credit with Metro Bank in the amount of \$150,000. Interest is payable monthly at the New York prime rate. Principal is due on demand. At year end there was no outstanding balance.

CONTINGENCIES (Cont'd.)

The Diocese has a line-of-credit with Mid-Penn Bank in the amount of \$150,000. Interest is payable monthly based on the prime rate as quoted in the Wall Street Journal. Principal is due on demand. The line-of-credit is secured by inventory, chattel paper, accounts, equipment and general intangibles. At year-end there was no outstanding balance.

In 1999, the Diocese purchased their office building. The Diocese borrowed \$ 200,000 from Citizens Bank to finance the purchase. The loan is secured by a mortgage on the Diocese office building and is payable in 173 installments of \$ 1,830 per month. Interest of 6.67% is included in the monthly payment. The loan balance at December 31, 2012 was \$ 32,858.

The Diocese provides the cost of a health insurance supplement policy to its retired clergy for life. For 2012, the monthly premium per clergy totaled approximately \$ 100 a month. The total paid for the year was \$ 38, 129.

JOINT VENTURE

In accordance with an agreement entered into in May 1993 and amended in May 2004 between the Lower Susquehanna Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America and the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania, a joint venture was created to form the St. Barnabas Center for Ministry. The Diocese paid \$ 12,000 in 2012 to support the St. Barnabas Center.

PENSION PLAN

The Church Pension Fund (The Fund) is a corporate body chartered in 1914 by the Legislature of the State of New York. Its incorporators and their successors are broadly authorized, as Trustees of the Fund, to establish and administer the clergy pension system of the Episcopal Church, including pensions, insurance, annuities, accident, health and other programs. The clergy and lay staff of the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania participate in this Fund.

The Fund was established by the General Convention of the Episcopal Church; it and its affiliates are official agencies of The Episcopal Church for these purposes and operate under the Canons of The Episcopal Church. The Fund began its operations on March 1, 1917. All operations are governed by The Fund's Board of Trustees, who are elected by the General Convention, or by a subsidiary Board consisting predominantly of Fund Trustees or subsidiary boards. The Fund's Clergy Plan and the Lay Employees Plan are defined-benefit pension plans whose assets are pooled for the benefit of all participants. It and other plans sponsored by The Fund and its affiliates are recognized as exempt from Federal income and certain other taxes; as Church plans, they are also exempt from the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 and, therefore, not subject to Pension Benefit Guaranty Corporation requirements.

The Fund levies assessments at the rate of 18% of participants' compensation (which includes salaries, housing and utility allowances and other cash compensation). For 2012, the qualifying compensation was approximately

\$376,500 and the current assessment paid was \$67,775.

The Diocese's lay staff are provided pension coverage through the Church Life Insurance Corporation. The Diocese contributes 9% of the employees' annual salary to annuities maintained by the Church Life Insurance Corporation. The employees may elect through salary reduction to defer additional amounts. For 2012, the qualifying compensation was approximately \$83,396 and the assessment paid was \$208.

OPERATING LEASES

The Diocese leased certain office equipment under leases with varying terms through 2012. In 2012, they obtained a copier lease and service agreement with a term through May 2017. At December 31, 2012, the minimum rental payments under noncancellable leases with a term in excess of one year were as follows:

RELATED PARTIES

The Diocese loaned to the Bishop of the Diocese \$ 75,000 to purchase a personal residence. The loan is unsecured and interest free. The loan is payable upon the sale of the premises, or within six months of retirement or in relinquishment of his duties as Bishop.

CONCENTRATIONS

The Diocese revenues for the Missionary Budget Fund include amounts received from the sixty-six parishes within its Central Pennsylvania diocese. The Fair Share revenues represent 90% of the total revenues for the Missionary Budget Fund. The continuation of Diocese operations is usually assumed in financial accounting in the absence of evidence to the contrary. The Diocese is subject to the uncertainty as to the amounts of future support.

The Diocese maintains its cash balances in two financial institutions. Accounts are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation up to \$ 250,000. At December 31, 2012, the Diocese's uninsured balances totaled approximately \$ 246,922.
